TO BOOST STRENGTH OF ARMY CADETS

OTTAWA, March 17-(CP)-The Defence Department Friday announced a boost of 15,000 in the strength ceiling for Royal Canadian Army Cadets in Canada, to 65,000 from 50,000, in effect since 1946. Latest figures at army headquarters show an actual strength of 49,341 boys in 406 cadet corps across Canada. Of the 15,000 granted, Central Command has been allotted an increase of 9,000; Quebec Command, 1,000; and Eastern, Prairie and Western Commands, 500 each. A reserve of 3,500 will be held at headquarters-authorized later.

N.S. Tourist Trade Fell Off Last Year

HALIFAX, March 17 - (CP) - Nova Scotia's tourist business fell off in 1950 as compared with the peak year of 1949, Hon. Harold Connolly, minister in charge of the industry, told the Legislature today.

The report showed 19,119 fewer visitors, with their daily average expenditure 46 cents less and their total expenditures \$2,000,000 less than in 1949.

During the past few years he has been repeatedly called to Ottawa for administrative consultations, and has been recognized for some time as a man of brilliant attainments.

Employees of both the Summerside and Charlottetown offices know Mr. Currie well, and he has always had a soft spot in his heart for the Island. Mrs. Bruce at the banquet expressed the high regard of her fellow employees for Mr. and Mrs. Currie and presented a going-away gift.

LONDON, March 18 - (Reuters) - Russia is giving "colossal economic and cultural aid" to the North Koreans, Foreign Minister Pak Hen of North Korea wrote today in Fravde, official Soviet Communist Party organ. A Tass news agency dispatch said his story was in connection with the second anniversary of the Soviet-North Korean agreement on mutual economic and cultural aid.
