PORTLAND, ME., March 25. George Rolfe, an inoffensive man, was brutally murdered near College Corner in Falmouth, by Eben Williams, 21 years of age, who shot him through the heart with a rifle, and then cut off his head with an axe. The body was found as laid out for burial, and the head in a pail of water.

LATEST FROM THE NEW HEBRIDES.—Letters have been received from Dr. Geddie and Mr. Neilson, by the Panama route. All are well. Dr. Geddie was at Amelton, and was likely to remain there for some time. Mr. Neilson is located at present at Havannah Harbour, Fate; but as the station is unhealthy, his stay there is not finally determined. Letters from Mr. Gordon are encouraging. Mr. McSair is settled with him on Erromanga.—Ed.

PRESBYTERY OF P. E. ISLAND.—This court met, according to adjournment, on Thursday last, in the basement room of Queen Square Church. Owing to the absence of attendance occasioned by the state of the travelling, the special business for which this meeting had been convened could not be transacted. The Presbytery, therefore, after attending to certain routine business adjourned to meet in the Free Church, Charlottetown, on Wednesday, the 24th April. The ministers of all supplemented congregations are requested either to be present at this meeting, or to forward a statement of the circumstances of their congregations, and their claims for a continued supplement will probably then be considered and decided upon.

Some business was transacted and the meeting was adjourned until to-day. The shareholders expressed themselves satisfied with the Bank's statement.—Telegraph.

We are informed that the late blockade running steamer Secret, has been purchased by a Canadian Company, who intend placing her on the route between Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. The Secret is now undergoing repairs on the Marine Slip at Dartmouth.—Express.

FENIAN-MOVEMENTS.

A telegram from Montreal dated March 21, furnishes the following item of news:—

Nearly all the present members of Parliament in Lower Canada will be returned for the House of Commons. A large number are as yet unopposed. It is understood that the Elections will not take place until midsummer. An iron ore company has been formed there to carry on operations on the north shore of the St. Lawrence River, from Quebec to the division line of Canada and Newfoundland. The stock of the company is half a million of dollars.

Reports received by General Mitchell show that all is quiet on the frontier. There is no ground whatever for excitement on account of Fenian movements.

SENTENCES ON FENIAN ACCOMPLICES IN THE ARMY.—The sentence of the general court-martial, held some weeks ago, on three private soldiers of the 85th Regiment, accused of complicity in Fenianism, have been pronounced in the presence of the troops. Brein, alias Simpson, who was leading organizer of the conspiracy, was sentenced to penal servitude for life, Kavanagh to seven years, and Murtagh to five years' penal servitude.

SIGNIFICANT ASSOCIATION.—The following paragraph is cut from a Southern paper:—

"THE CONFEDERATE DEAD.—An association of ladies has been formed in Memphis for the purpose of raising funds to erect at Memphis, or some designated spot, a magnificent church edifice to the memory of the fallen Confederate dead, whose columns and tablets shall be inscribed with the names of all such who were furnished by auxiliary societies throughout the Southern States. The names of the following ladies are on the list of honorary members: Mrs. Jefferson Davis, Mrs. Robert E. Lee, Mrs. Frank P. Blair, Mrs. N. B. Forrest, Mrs. L. M. Keitt, Mrs. Andrew Johnson, Miss Augusta Evans, Mrs. J. A. Longstreet, and others.

[Telegram from Ch'town to Major Mackinlay] I have seen the Attorney General. He says: "The clause in question is simply directory to Captains; neglect of duty on their part cannot invalidate the law." Besides, see clause sixty-four. You are setting under that authority. It was more than three months after the Act for Companies here.
