

CURRENT NOTES.

Sir Charles Tupper has subscribed \$100, towards the Volunteer Aid Fund. Arthur Sullivan, the composer, has sailed on the steamer Etruria, for New York. An American who had lost all his money by gambling, at Monte Carlo, has committed suicide by taking morphine. It is reported that the Duke of Connaught, will go to Ireland next autumn and make an extended tour of the country. Forty Moors are going to America by order of the Government of Morocco, to study the manufacture of breech loading guns. An Independence Belge correspondent described Pope Leo as a hard working man, but ever ascetic; he speaks little and laughs never. The revisers of the Bible, presented a copy to the Empress of Germany, who has sent a graceful letter expressing her thanks for the present. The troubles of the Bulgarian frontier are increasing, and an additional force of Turkish troops has been sent to put down the insurrection of the brigands. At a large meeting of musicians of London, England, a resolution was passed in favor of the adoption of the French pitch of 5 1/2 double vibrations for the treble. Yokohama's chief boast is the popularity of newspapers among her inhabitants. Eight large papers and eight pictorials have a combined circulation of 54,000 copies. Gen. Ciadini has refused to form a New Italian Ministry. It is now regarded as very likely that Signor Depretis, the late Prime Minister, will reform the old cabinet. It is rumored that Mr. Chamberlain and Sir Charles Dike will visit Ireland shortly to enquire as to the greatest extent to which it would be practicable to carry out the Local Government scheme. A gang of workmen on the Pennsylvania Railroad, stepped from the north to the south track, at north bend out, to avoid a train, when they were run into by a mud train. Three were instantly killed. In the French chambers of deputies a few days ago, during the debate on the loan, M. Daynard stated that the Government really wanted a loan of 300,000,000 instead of 65,000,000, but was afraid to ask for that amount before the elections. Panama hats are made in Guayaquil, Ecuador, and received their name from the fact that Panama merchants formerly controlled the trade. They are made of the pita fibre, a species of palm, and are braided under water by women. A single strand used in making a hat is often fifteen feet long. It sometimes takes three weeks to braid a single hat which sells for \$25. It will take a year to set up Bertoldi's statue of Liberty in the harbor of New York. Upon its completion, and when it first stands forth in full view, it will be a bright, gold-like color such as that of a new penny. The metal is pure copper, and not bronze, so that it will have a strong reddish instead of a yellowish tinge. The winds and rains of one or two winters, however, will change this color, and the statue will take on its permanent tinge of dark reddish brown.

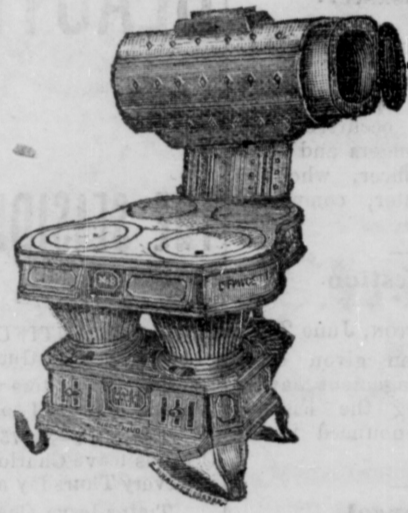
