MEMORIAL SERVICES — On Friday, February 15th, memorial services were held in Georgetown for his late Majesty King George VI at 1:00 p.m. A goodly number braved the cold and storm assembled at the Post Office, where a parade was formed up headed by His Worship Mayor P. L. Boudreau and Rev. W. A. Paterson, president of the Georgetown branch of the Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., war veterans, members of the Ladies' Auxiliary and citizens marched to the War Memorial on Kent Street and there under the direction of Captain J. B. Scully a two minutes' silence was observed. Mayor Boudreau then laid a wreath for the Town of Georgetown and Rev. W. A. Paterson laid a wreath for the Canadian Legion and the Ladies Auxiliary. Those assembled then sang "God Save the Queen". At 2:00 p.m. a memorial service for Protestant denominations was held in St. David's United Church by Rev. W. A. Paterson. At 3:00 p.m. a memorial service was held in St. James Church, conducted by Rev. O. Kirgins.

N. S. Legislature Opening Today

HALIFAX, Feb. 18 (CP) — The Nova Scotia Legislature will open on a sombre note tomorrow with government officials in mourning for the late King George VI.

The traditional pagentry usually attending such an opening will be dispensed with and opening day business will be cut short. Lieutenant-Governor J. A. D. McCurdy will read the Speech from the Throne. Then messages of sympathy to the Royal Family and loyalty to the new Queen will be offered.

Following that the House will probably adjourn until Wednesday. The legislature was scheduled to open Feb. 12 but was delayed by the monarch's death.

Roderick MacLean (L-Inverness) will move and Arthur Thurlow (L-Lunenburg) will second the reply to the Speech from the Throne. New taxation appears likely to be one of the top items for debate along with teachers' salaries.
