Buried Under Trench Cave-in

While engaged in connecting cement culverts in an eight foot trench at the Maritime Electric plant yesterday, Athol Jenkins, an employee of Bevan Bros., was buried for several minutes when a side of the trench suddenly gave way. His predicament was first noticed by a fellow worker, Dennis Webster, who was working on the other side of the culvert. He quickly spread the alarm and, aided by County Construction workers, who were nearby, was able to extricate the victim. Mr. Jenkins was taken by ambulance to the P.E.I. Hospital where his injuries were said to consist of cuts about the face and shock.

Returns From Tour of Europe

Miss Mildred Harrington of the Model School teaching staff, has just returned from an extensive 10 week conducted tour of Europe. In an interview yesterday Miss Harrington stated that of the 12 countries visited her choice was Holland and Switzerland. Among the highlights for scenery were the motor trip over the French and Italian Alps, where they reached a height of more than 1500 feet; the Isle of Capri, near Naples; the trip along the French and Italian Riviera, the boat trip on the Rhine; and the day tour of Southern Ireland; each of which gave an entirely different panorama of beauty - from the rugged breath taking trip over the Alps to the quiet picturesque beauty of Killarney Lakes.

The tours included visits to all the famous museums, cathedrals, castles and shrines of each of the 12 countries visited. Among the outstanding shrines visited were Loretto, Lourdes, Paray Le Monial, and the Vatican where the 35 members who were on the tour were privileged to have a private audience with His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

Miss Harrington said that reading of the arts and culture of the countries is of great educational value but, she added, "seeing is believing". Miss Harrington took 15 colored films on her camera during the tour which should prove of special interest and educational value in her work as teacher of the senior class at Model School.

REPORT POLIO DECLINE

WASHINGTON (AP) — Polio in the United States apparently has passed its peak for 1955, the public health service said Thursday. The service's weekly report on polio cases listed by the states showed 2,033 in the week ended Sept. 3. In the comparable 1954 week there were 2,101 cases. The cases reported last week represented a drop of 256 from the week ended Aug. 27.

Charlottetown District Teachers Convention Opens

The annual fall convention of the Charlottetown rural teachers' commenced activities at P. W. C. yesterday with Mrs. Grace MacKinnon as president and Mrs. Anna Rodd as secretary. The following committees were appointed: press — Miss Jessie MacNevin and Mr. Vincent Beck; resolutions — Mrs. Austin Coady, Mr. Foster Burke and Miss Ellen Munn; nominations — Mrs. Betty MacEwen, Miss Eileen Murry, Mrs. Austin MacCallum; question box — Miss Sue Jones and Mrs. Donald Livingstone.

Mrs. MacKinnon in her address urged the teachers to take advantage of summer school courses offered wherever they might be and also to take part in educational meetings. This, then, would help to raise their professional status. Miss Estelle Bowness gave a report on the activities of the P. E. I. Teachers Federation for the year 1954-55. In her report she urged the teachers to remain in the profession. In touching on teachers' salaries Miss Bowness reported that teachers on P. E. I. are the lowest paid in the Dominion and that P. E. I. is the only province where the teachers have not insisted on better pay. Mr. Shaw followed. Dr. Shaw offered suggestions on the teaching of Geography and History. He pointed out that demonstration lessons are effective in transmitting ideas to pupils.

The supervisors, Mr. Rice and Mr. Ross, welcomed the teachers at the afternoon session and commended the teachers for their work. Mr. Rice stressed the importance of the teachers' work. Continued on Page 13

A Statement By The Charlottetown Retail Merchants' Association Regarding Business Hours

The Charlottetown Retail Merchants' Association was formed on June 1, 1954. One of the main objectives of the Association was that the Charlottetown Retail Merchants could, through this Association, establish uniform business hours for all members.

At a general meeting of the Association held at City Hall on Feb. 8, 1955, a motion was made concerning new business hours for the Summer months. The motion was carried and new store hours were adopted until Sept. 1, 1955. As we all know, a number of the members did not abide by the majority vote; however, that is past history.

On August 11th last, another general meeting was held with a large membership present. A secret ballot was taken as to whether the new business hours would be continued or should the stores revert to the old business hours. Before this ballot was counted, the chairman pointed out to the meeting that it was useless to take this vote unless the members of the Association were willing to abide by the result of the majority vote; he brought to the attention of those present the disadvantages to both the buying public and the merchants in trying to operate on two different schedules. Therefore, a motion was put "that all those in favor of abiding by the majority vote signify their approval". This was carried unanimously with not a single "nay" vote. The ballots were then counted and the majority was in favor of retaining the new store hours—(open all day Wednesday, open Friday evening, closing at noon Saturday).

It is now evident, however, that a small minority group of the members again have no intention of abiding by the wishes of the Association, although it is always understood in any democratic organization that the majority vote rules. The Charlottetown Retail Merchants' Association has no intention of being ruled by a very small majority. THE WISH OF THE ASSOCIATION AS DECLARED BY THE VOTE WILL BE CARRIED THROUGH AND THE PRESENT BUSINESS HOURS WILL BE RETAINED.
