OUR readers will no doubt be pleased to read the following extract from a letter received from Master Jabez Barnard, of Charlottetown, who sailed in the missionary vessel "Day Spring." The letter is dated at New South Wales, Australia, June 21st, 1866.

"We are on our way to Melbourne to meet the missionaries who are coming out to the Islands. The ship in which they are coming has been over a hundred days out from England, and is expected every day in Melbourne. The "Day Spring" has been laid up for three days, and is about to depart for some coast where which we have heard of. We will wait in the wharf in the morn'g, and expect to leave in about a week or two hours. Our last passage from the Islands was tremendously rough and stormy. We got out of the trade winds it blew a gale from the S.W., and blew so hard that the Captain was afraid to run her any farther. She shipped a few seas on the quarter, but hever her, and about eight bells on the boats went clean off the davits. Next morning the Captain ran her again, and it came on to blow and rain; we saw a large vessel at eight bells, but we put her on the other side and lost sight of her vessel which was probably lost, as she was Sydney Head. There was a distressed vessel which sighted, and next morning we saw a large ship on the outside of the harbor, but she was not known. I am quite and

Latest from Europe! News by the Cable!

TORONTO, C. W., Oct. 8. The Revenue of the Province for Sept. was \$1,170,000, and the expenditure \$716,000.

Government is negotiating with the Home authorities for the establishment of an armory in Canada. A notice from the English Admiralty Office is published warning navigators against anchoring near the Cable.

BOSTON, Oct. 9. N. Y. 9th.—Steamer Evening Star, from this city for New Orleans, founded at sea 180 miles east of South Carolina coast, by which nearly three hundred lives were lost.

The President has issued a proclamation for a National Thanksgiving on November 29th.

British steamer Queen Victoria founded at sea on the 4th inst., in lat. 33 00, long. 70, 30. The passengers and crew were picked up by a vessel yesterday by the big Point from New York. The Engineer died from exposure, and the mate was washed overboard.

THE insurgent movement among the Germans is spreading rapidly.

The Cabinet of the late Emperor of Russia is reported to be in a state of confusion.

The proclamation taking possession of the kingdom of Hanover was promulgated by the Government yesterday, Oct. 10.

The loyalty of the people in all cases is demanded.

BOSTON, Oct. 9th. New York 9th, p. m.—A Toronto despatch says the Assizes opened yesterday.

The Judge, in charging the Jury, paid a tribute to the Irishmen for devotion to their native land, and condemned the United States authorities for not crushing the Fenian movement in its incipient stage.

Santa Anna addressed the Fenians at their Picnic on Staten Island yesterday, in which he highly complimented the Irishmen.

Col. Roberts in the evening addressed the St. Patrick's Circle, and severely denounced the Government, Stephens, and the New York merchants who had failed to make good their promises.

We understand that at a meeting of the Presbytery of P. E. Island convened at New London, South, on Tuesday last, principally for the purpose of considering the demission of the Rev.
