The field was trimmed to the best 45 scores and ties for the final two rounds Friday. It took 149 to qualify and 47 made the final.

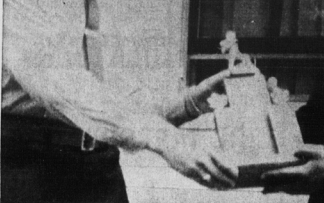
Rodgers, Nicklaus and Palmer were the lone American survivors. Gary Player of South Africa got in with 75-70-145.
