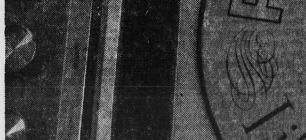

The Day Of A Poet's Birth Is Fondly Remembered

It was 204 years ago this January morning, the wintry winds to which the infant Burns was born "laved himself in Roblin". And honoring his gift of poetry which has contributed so much to make his native land revered and loved everywhere, even by those who have never set foot on her heathen hills, folks pause to honour the Day. We look back to recall tales told of the mirrored hills, the hills and the glens. We of this day and that clan, re-gain history forgotten, the hear the music of the pipes, and wear with pride our air tartans today.

We take down from its shelves a Book and to a Scotsman, how many books are there? Two... the Bible, and the volume of Burns' writings, his immortal verse and his letters. And clearly the two books are alike. His inspiration in so many instances was drawn from the Bible, he knew and loved.

We re-read the poems beloved, those we learned when our world was young. And we recall the sparkling epigrams which are much quoted, and which serve to illustrate some Bible truth: the bits and pieces so lovely:

"Who made the heart, 'He alone, decidedly can try us..."

"Pleasures are like poppies spread; you seize them, pleasure flows; it's bloom is shed..."

"Nae man can get their time or wad some power the giftie gie us, to see ourselves as others see us..."

"Where you feel your honour grip, let that eye be your border..."
