

Yankees Blank Indians; Dodgers Down Phillies

CLEVELAND (AP) — Whitey Ford won his sixth shutout of the season as New York Yankees whitewashed Cleveland Indians 6-0 Friday night. Elston Howard's two-run homer in the sixth inning broke a scoreless tie.

The Yankee triumph extended the American League leaders' winning streak to six games.

Ray Narveski, making his first start in two weeks, incurred his eighth loss against 10 won. Ford is now 13-4.

CHICAGO (AP) — Right-hander Dick Donovan of Chicago White Sox, backed by three double plays, turned back Boston Red Sox 4-0 Friday night.

The victory was the fourth straight for Donovan, giving him a 7-10 record.

The White Sox scored all their runs in the first two innings at the expense of starter Frank Sullivan who went down to his fourth

defeat against eight victories.

DETROIT (AP) — Washington Senators rallied for a pair of ninth-inning runs and defeated Detroit Tigers 4-3 Friday night, sending the saging Detroiters down to their ninth loss in 10 games.

The Senators, breaking a three-game losing streak, rallied on the strength of pinch singles by Ed Fitz Gerald and Herb Plews. Plews drove in the tying run and Bob Malmkus batted across the winning tally.

Roy Sievers slugged his 26th home run for Washington and drove across another with an eighth-inning single.

Truman Clevenger pitched three scoreless innings and got credit for the victory. Hank Aguirre was the loser.

PITTSBURGH, — (AP) — Kurt Raydon blanked the second-place San Francisco Giants on four hits

Friday night as Pittsburgh Pirates won their fourth straight game, 10-0.

Bob Skinner led the Pirates 16th inning with three hits, including a tremendous home run to the right field roof. Skinner's blast was only the fifth homer to reach or clear the 90-foot-high roof in the history of Forbes Field. The distance to right field is 300 feet.

The Dodgers sent 11 men to the plate in their big inning. They forced Phillie pitchers Jim Hearn and Dick Farrell to the showers before Jack Meyer quieted the uprising.

Midgets To Headline Next Local Wrestling Program

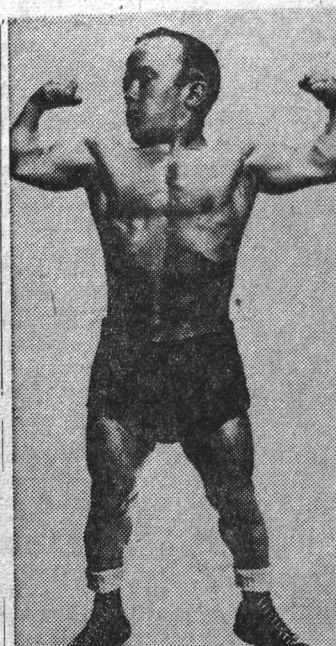
against Major Tom Thumb and the meanest and one of the agilest wrestlers in the world today, Sky Low Low.

Aussies Capture Majority Of B.E. Swimming Titles

CARDIFF (CP) — British Empire Games swimming ended Friday night in a great smash of world records and the familiar sight of three Australian world titleholders smiling coyly on the victory line.

The almost unbelievable Aussies, who predicted before they struck a toe in Empire Pool that they would win 11 of the 19 titles at stake in the six-day competition, hit the mark right on the nose. They carried away the Games swimming championship and a bucketful of medals for six runner-up and five third-place finishes.

England with six champions, placed second. Scotland won the only other two first-place gold medals — 17-year-old Ian Black winning the men's 220-yard butterfly and Peter Heady the men's tower diving. Canada didn't win a gold medal but the surprisingly strong team of seven men and six women harvested silver and bronze medals with four seconds and four thirds.

FOUR WORLD MARKS
Four world records and more than 30 previous games marks were submerged before the final session got under way and the

swimmers, most of them lean teen-agers, really went to town in the last hours.

The Australians shattered one world record and three games records Friday night and a team of British girls came up with a double world record performance. Canada's swimmers weren't out of place in such brilliant company. They took one silver and two bronze medals.

Canada finished second as the Australian men's 440-yard medley relay team of John Monckton, Terry Gathercole, Brian Wilkinson and John Davitt won the men's 440-yard medley relay championship in world record time of 4:14.2. The old world record was 4:19 set by the same Aussie foursome earlier this year.

England thrilled the capacity throng in the women's 440-yard

medley relay race with a world record 4:54. Australia was second and Canada third.

The English girls clipped exactly three seconds off the time set by a Dutch foursome in 1957. Australia followed the English girls to the touch in 4:55.1, also better than the 1957 mark, but there was more to come.

The electric timing system clocked Judy Grimham, world 110-backstroke record-holder and first leg of England's team in 1:11.9, equalling her mark set two nights before. Australia's Dawn Fraser, who holds the world record for the women's 110 yard freestyle, swam her leg in 1:06.6, but the time will not be submitted for recognition. Only records set by first-leg swimmers on relay teams receive official recognition.

Eric Hanson, popular member of the host Scarborough club, finally shook off persistent Bob Bruie of Milwaukee to win 3 and 2 with a four-hole spurge down the final nine.

Bruce Castator of the nearby Weston Club romped away from little Wilf Homenuk of Winnipeg, for an 8 and 7 victory.

In contrast to the Castator-Homenuk match, Hanson and the 23-year-old Milwaukee golfer fought it out virtually hole for hole until Hanson started his stretch run.
