The unit has been instrumental in bringing to medical attention many incipient cases of tuberculosis which were able to be curable at its beginning, and is still continuing its good work throughout the Island. It is hoped that all citizens will take advantage of this convenience today while the unit is at the Guardian Office for its last day.

Funeral Of Mr. William McCarron

He had been in good health until a year ago, and had been quite active, until his last recent illness. He was well known in this community and throughout the surrounding districts for his kindness and geniality. He leaves to mourn three sisters, Margaret, Kathryn, and Anne, all residing in Boston, Mass. To them the heartfelt sympathy of all their friends is extended. Dwelling At Iona Burned

The home of Mrs. Bernard Flynn, a two-storey farm dwelling at Iona, was completely destroyed by fire on Tuesday morning. The fire, originating in the fine, broke out about 11 o'clock in the morning and was first discovered by neighbors, who, although forming a bucket brigade to combat the flames, were unable to save the building. It was reported that the fire was well underway before it was discovered. All the upstairs furniture and household effects were destroyed, although most of the furnishings on the ground floor were saved. The house was occupied at the time by Mrs. Flynn, her daughter and one grandson. No persons were injured. The estimated damage and loss was unavailable, and the house was not insured.

Dwelling Burned At Morell Rear

The dwelling of Wilfred Dunphy of Morell Rear was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon. A fire started in the kitchen and spread to the ground floor, including many articles were saved from this old dwelling which has been owned by the Dunphy family for several generations. A high wind was blowing at the time and only the efforts of the Morell Fire Department prevented the flames spreading to a new school building nearby. The wind blew the flames away from the Dunphy barns, but one close to the house was kept wet down during the height of the blaze. Flames were breaking through the roof when discovered and it was thought possible it originated from a flue fire. There had been no fire in the kitchen stove from noon. The outbreak occurred about 3 p.m. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

A fire, on the same side of the school last fall, did a similar amount of damage and serves to stress the necessity of having the dry wood in shingles covered as soon as possible with shingles of the asphalt variety.
