Browns' Manager Slams Back At Cobb's Criticism

NEW YORK, June 2 — (AP) — Rogers Hornsby slammed back at Ty Cobb's blast of modern day baseball and left the Georgian peach off his all-time team.

In the current issue of Look magazine, the St. Louis Browns manager listed five outfielders, including Joe DiMaggio and Ted Williams, ahead of Cobb.

"Why should he put the rap on the game that made him?" Hornsby wrote.

Hornsby disputed Cobb's assertion that Phil Rizzuto and Stan Musial are the only moderns who would have stood out in the dead ball era.

"What is Cobb talking about?" he wrote. "George Kell, Tiger third baseman, is almost as scientific a batter as Cobb was himself. Billy Goodman (Boston Red Sox) is the same type. And there are several others in both leagues. Does Cobb honestly believe Jackie Robinson of the Brooklyn Dodgers wouldn't have been a star in the old days?"

The Rajah also took exception to Cobb's criticism of modern managers for too much "shifting around."

"Cobb did the same thing when he managed the Tigers," Hornsby wrote. "He was too impatient to be a good manager. Considering his record and shortcomings as a manager, where does Cobb come off pointing at managers today?"

Johnny Hopp Signs Contract With Detroit

DETROIT, June 2 — (AP) — First baseman Johnny Hopp, cast off by New York Yankees 10 days ago, signed a contract today for a reported \$15,000 with the last-place Detroit Tigers of the American League.

Hopp, used mostly as a pinch-hitter, batted only 206 last season for the Yankees and was made a free agent. General manager Charley Gehringer of the Tigers conferred with the 35-year-old veteran here and signed him to "increase our bench strength."

To make room for Hopp, who had a lifetime major league average of .298 in his 13 seasons prior to 1952, the Tigers sold rookie outfielder George Lerchen to their Buffalo farm club in the international League.

Dodgers Send Third Baseman For X-ray

CHICAGO, June 2 — (AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers decided today to send Bill Cox, crippled third baseman, home to long Island to have his left arm x-rayed. Cox was hit on the left arm by Cincinnati's Frank Smith in a record 15-run inning 12 days ago and there is still a large lump above the elbow.

The cast was removed from catcher Roy Campanella's right thumb today and he was able to throw and take batting practice with a cushioned bat. But Brooklyn manager Charlie Dressen decided to keep him out of the line-up another day or two.

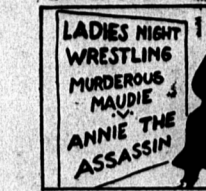

Charlottetown's Benny Carson, one of the brightest pitching prospects to come out of this province for quite some time, will be tossing the sphere for Curran and Briggs Juniors of Summerside for at least the month of June. Benny made his first start with the C. & B. outfit on Sunday afternoon in an exhibition game against the Summerside R. C. A. F. and struck out 17 batters. He worked for nine innings and in that time gave up six runs, three of them in the last inning.

Benny is slated to report on Edmundston, New Brunswick on or about the first of July. The Brooklyn Dodgers have a try-out camp and ball team at Edmundston and it is expected that Carson will play with them during the summer months. Until then Benny will work under the guidance of Johnny Carroll, the Duke University graduate who will coach the Summerside team. O'Connor the scout for the Brooklyn Dodgers in the Maritimes and New England.

We know little about Carroll's ability as a coach. We know, however, that he was offered a chance to play for the Brooklyn organization several years ago but turned it down to continue College. Referee Suspended In Davey-Basilio Bout

NEW YORK, June 2 — (AP) — The dispute Chuck Davey-Carmer Basilio fight at Syracuse last Thursday today was officially ruled a draw and the referee was suspended indefinitely.

Chairman Bob Christenberry of the New York State Athletic Commission, after consulting by telephone with other members of the commission, announced his ruling today.

"The fight is declared a draw and referee Joe Palmer is suspended indefinitely," ruled Christenberry. The reason for the suspension was "the very poor card" turned in by the referee scoring the bout.

Originally announced as an upset win for Basilio, a Syracuse Boy, over previously unbeaten Davey of Lansing, Mich., the decision was voided 30 minutes later by action of deputy commissioner Thomas Grauity of Troy, N. Y.

Grauity found Palmer's card incomplete and left the ultimate decision with Christenberry.

Jersey Joe And Charles Weigh Same For Fight

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 2 — (AP) — Heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott and his challenger, Ezzard Charles, underwent physical examinations today and to the surprise of all each weighed 196 3-4 pounds.

This is exceptionally heavy for Ezzard. He never weighed more than 186 for a title fight before and had expected to weigh 191 for the Thursday night 15-rounder in Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium. Walcott had announced he'd enter the ring at 194.

Dr. W. G. B. Terry, of the Pennsylvania Athletic Commission, reported both fighters in excellent condition.

Charles was examined at his nearby Pleasantville camp while Walcott took his physical here.

The commission ruled that Charles will have to trim his mustache short. Walcott's manager wanted Charles to shave it off.

N. H. L. Annual Meeting Dates

MONTREAL, June 2 — (CP) — President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League announced tonight that the league's annual meeting has been set back for a week and will now be held June 17-18. Some club owners and officials said they could not attend on the earlier date.

Most significant business facing the meeting is Cleveland's application to leave the American Hockey League and join the N.H.L.

The N. H. L. governors approved providing the Barons prove financial stability. General manager Jim Hendy said last week this had been done.

To Control Building In Airport Areas

OTTAWA, June 2 — (CP) — The commons today passed legislation to restrict the height, use and location of buildings around Canada's airports as a safety measure.

Third reading was given the legislation after Howard Green (PC-Vancouver Quadra) and Gordon Graydon (PC-Peel) objected to the wording of a clause respecting compensation for property adversely affected by the legislation.

Transport Minister Chevrier said it must be remembered that "new ground" is being broken by the legislation. Careful study had been given the bill but if difficulty arose in carrying out the compensation provisions, it could be changed later. He believed the compensation provision was quite fair.

The Minister said it was the intention to zone Canada's major transcontinental airports first and "then go on from there."

Jets Complete Second Stage of Flight

LONDON, June 2 — (Reuters) — R.C.A.F. headquarters in London said tonight it does not expect the arrival from Canada of 20 R.C.A.F. Sabre jets at Kinloss, Scotland, until tomorrow.

He added that a signal has been sent out to ascertain the proposed landing time of the planes but he does not expect an answer tonight.

The jets will join Atlantic Pact defence forces in Britain.

(The R.C.A.F. at Montreal reported earlier that the jets had landed at Goose Bay, Labrador, from Baguville, Que., to complete the second state of their flight.)

Kiner Follows Form Sheet Like Prescription

PITTSBURGH, June 2 — (AP) — Ralph Kiner is following his form chart as though it were the law of the land.

You can't blame him. The pride of Pittsburgh's Pirates has followed the same pattern for six straight home run championships of the Na-

ional League. That's a championship for every season he's been in the big time.

Always a slow starter, Kiner now appears to be shaking off the lags which have plagued him since the season started.

After three months of listless hitting, he began last week the home run chases for which he is paid around \$75,000 a year.

He stepped up to the plate Sunday against the Phillies to hit a ninth-inning home run which broke a tie and gave the last-place Pirates a 2-1 victory.

That clout was his fifth homer in eight days and the seventh of the season.

Kiner fans gleefully point out the Pirates have won all the contests in which Mr. Slug hit his last four homers. In three of the games, his home runs were directly responsible for the victories.

Last season Kiner rapped his Seventh homer on the same date. In 1950 and 1951 he had nine homers by June 1. His best mark on June 1 was set in 1949 when he had accounted for 12 homers by that date.

He has hit 11 grand-slam homers in the big leagues, one less than the National League all-time record of 12 set by Rogers Hornsby.

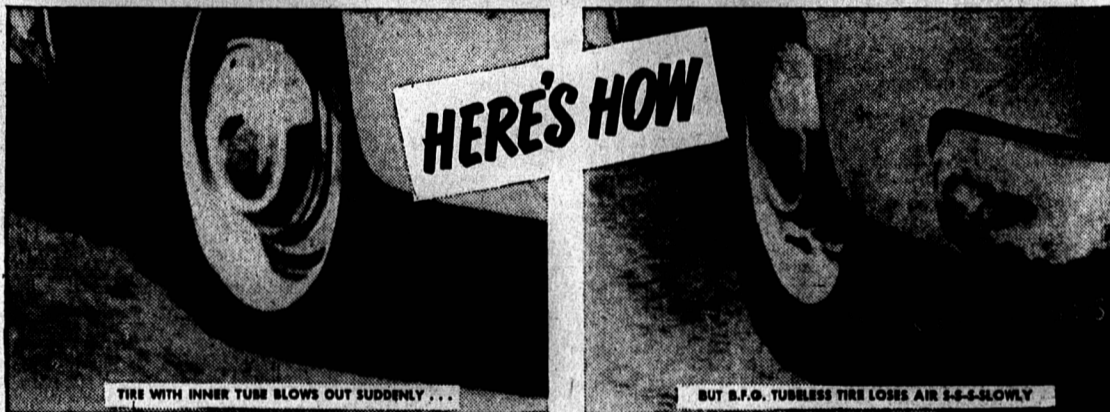
