Georgetown School Annual Meeting

The annual school meeting of Georgetown School District No. 1, was held in the Town Hall on Tuesday, June 1, with 23 rate payers in attendance.

Mr. S. C. Knight was appointed chairman for the meeting. The annual report of the Board of Trustees was given by Mr. Raymond Solomon, President of the Board of Trustees. In his report Mr. Solomon reviewed the work done during the past year and listed the improvements made. He informed the meeting that two notes at the bank, each amounting to \$500.00, had been paid during the year and that \$250.00 had been paid to the Teachers' Federation and an outstanding bill of \$100.00 had also been paid. He thanked the Holy Name Society and the Town Council for their very considerable help, in connection with a show, which had been held to raise money for the school during the winter.

The auditor's report was then dealt with and as of May 31, it showed receipts of \$5180.85 and expenditures of \$4867.28 with a balance in the bank and on hand of \$313.57. Approximately \$1700.00 is owing in taxes and about \$2,000 owing on supplements and unpaid bills. Following a considerable discussion on financial matters the auditor's report was adopted. Mr. A. E. Jenkins was re-appointed as auditor.

The amount of \$2665. was voted for teacher's supplements and the amount of \$2150. was voted for school running expenses. Mr. Charles Fraser was appointed as a trustee, to fill the vacancy on the Board caused by the completion of a three-year term by Mr. Cecil L. Lacheur.

The meeting authorized the secretary to post a list of all defaulters at once. The question of putting on an entertainment during the summer to assist the School Board in paying a number of outstanding accounts was discussed. A committee was appointed to contact the various organizations in the town, asking them at the June monthly meeting to appoint delegates to meet at a future date to discuss the proposed entertainment.

SILVER JUBILEE ON MONDAY OF SISTERS OF THE PRECIOUS BLOOD

On Monday, June 7th, the Sisters Adorers of the Precious Blood, 128 Sydney Street, Charlottetown, are to observe the Silver Jubilee of their foundation in this city. Due to lack of room to accommodate their many friends and benefactors, they are unable to hold any public celebration. They had hoped to begin their new Monastery this spring, and had planned on celebrating this anniversary in their new quarters later in the year, and to hold a public reception; but their financial status makes this venture impossible for at least another year.

Founded at St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, by Aurelia Couette in 1861, the Sisters Adorers of the Most Precious Blood now count thirty-three Monasteries. The Sisters from the Monastery in China have been recalled to Canada and the United States until such time as conditions warrant their return there. Rome, Cuba, and Japan have also their Adorers.

In June, 1929, the Roman Catholic diocese of Charlottetown celebrated the 100th anniversary of its founding and on that occasion His Excellency, the late Bishop Louis J. O'Leary, erected a new sanctuary—the Monastery of the Precious Blood, seven Sisters under the superintendence of Reverend Mother Saint Joseph having come from Edmonton to open the new house. The original quarters having become overcrowded, in 1935 His Excellency, Most Reverend J. M. Sullivan, the then Bishop of Charlottetown, gave the Sisters permission to build an addition. Now in 1954, the present Monastery is again facing need of expansion, but the present location makes this impossible.

Four of the original foundresses have left to help other foundations—three still remaining. The present community now numbers twenty Sisters—two from Newfoundland, two from Nova Scotia, and the remainder from Prince Edward Island.

Self-Governing In the mind of the Foundress, each Monastery was to be self-governing—independent, yet united by the common rules, usages and customs.

Saxton Cleared From Charges

NEW YORK, (AP) - Welterweight boxer Johnny Saxton was cleared of a charge of possessing a 38-calibre revolver without a licence.

Saxton, 23, was arrested Wednesday night after his bride of a few months complained he had threatened her with a loaded gun. When police arrived she withdrew her assault complaint, but Saxton was held on the gun charge.

In court Thursday, Magistrate Alexander Del Giorgio dismissed the weapons charge because of lack of evidence.

Saxton is slated to fight welterweight champion Kid Gavilan in September for the title.

Large Number Of Women Graduates At U. Of Montreal

MONTREAL (CP) - Nearly one of every seven graduates at University of Montreal's convocation ceremonies is a woman.

And except for a few who are members of religious orders, they're all headed for careers. Slightly fewer than 100 women graduated in a class of 705 students Friday.

Eight of them took degrees in medicine, four in law, two in philosophy, and the remainder in general arts and science. Most are from Montreal or nearby centres. One of the outsiders, Georgina Junemann of Chile, got her Ph.D. in philosophy and psychology. She intends to return home to teach these subjects at the University of Chile.

ORGANIZATION OF FIRST P. E. I. HISTORICAL SOCIETY IN 1881

Interesting in connection with the revival of the P. E. Island Historical Society are the newspaper references to the organization of the original Society, which have been copied from old files by Major T. E. MacNutt, and from which the following information is taken:

The first announcement to appear was on Sept. 10, 1881. This was signed by Messrs. G. W. Hodgson, John Caven, L. H. Davies, George Alley, Malcolm MacLeod and D. Ferguson. It was addressed to leading citizens of Charlottetown, requesting them to be present at a meeting in the Legislative Library on Monday, the 12th instant, at 4 p. m.

In response to this invitation, the following gentlemen met at the specified time and place: His Honour Chief Justice Palmer, Hon. L. H. Davies, W. H. Watson, Erick De St. Croix Brecken, Hon. Benjamin Davies, Hon. Donald Ferguson, Hon. Andrew A. Macdonald, Rev. G. W. Hodgson, Rev. Kenneth McLennan, Rev. D. G. Donald, Rev. Donald McNeill, Rev. J. C. Davison, Rev. D. W. Bambrick, Rev. Alfred Osborne, Judge Alley, Dr. Taylor, Dr. Blanchard, Owen Cronley, William Heard, E. J. Hodgson, W. L. Cotton, John LePage, James E. Byrne, Henry Lawson, P. R. Bowers, Hon. J. C. Davison, Rev. D. W. Bambrick, John Ball, J. W. Morrison, T. McKinley, Charles Palmer, Archd. McNeill, Charles C. Gardiner, Frank W. Beer, T. A. LePage, Malcolm MacLeod, E. A. Hales, Henry C. Blatch, James Brown and W. C. DesBrisay, Esquires.

In addressing the meeting Mr. Bulmer referred to the importance of preserving the records of a country, and to the necessity of an Historical Society to see that this be regularly done and not left to chance. He spoke of the valuable materials of history in possession of the Massachusetts Historical Society and that of Quebec. He narrated the efforts that had been made to found one for Nova Scotia previous to 1878, when the present Society was established. He regretted the great loss that had arisen to the Province, from the want of such an institution at an earlier time, and felt it of the greatest importance that an Historical Society for P. E. Island should at once be organized.

First Officers At this meeting it was decided, on motion of Hon. D. Ferguson, seconded by Hon. L. H. Davies, to form the Historical Society and to proceed with the election of officers. The following were chosen: President, Lieutenant Governor Haviland; Vice President, Chief Justice Palmer; Treasurer, Charles Palmer, Esq.; Recording Secretary, Mr. T. A. LePage; Committee, Judge Alley, Rev. G. W. Hodgson, Malcolm MacLeod, Esq., Hon. A. A. Macdonald, P. R. Bowers, Esq., Judge Alley later agreed to act as corresponding secretary, without remuneration.

Signatures were obtained from the members, pledging themselves to pay an entrance fee of five dollars and an annual subscription of two dollars, or such annual sum as might afterwards be determined by the Society. On the following January 16 and 17, The Examiner listed several additional names to the roll of original members, also numerous

contributions in the way of old newspapers, pamphlets and almanacs. At a meeting held on Nov. 21 following, the report of the committee appointed to solicit subscriptions was submitted, showing a total membership of 111 and a sum of \$250 collected, leaving \$527 still unpaid for entrance fees and annual subscriptions.

The Committee Report "The Committee," was reported, "have taken steps to procure a suitable place for holding their meetings, and for keeping the collections of the Society. Although definite arrangements has yet been made, they have reason to hope that the Government will shortly place at their disposal suitable apartments in the Provincial Building for this purpose.

The Committee intend to apply to the Legislature at its next meeting for an Act of Incorporation of the Society of the best kind that at the next session legislative provision will also be made for an amalgamation of the Legislative Library with that of the Society, under the joint management of a committee selected from the members of both bodies, as has been done in Nova Scotia. Under such management the Legislative Library of Nova Scotia which, until the amalgamation, was fast going to ruin from neglect on the part of the Government has now become one of the best Provincial Libraries in the Dominion, and equally beneficial results will follow if a similar course is adopted. Our Provincial Library has suffered much from neglect in the past. Many of the most valuable works are rendered incomplete from volumes having been lent or taken without authority, and never returned.

The Society have in view the formation of an Act of Incorporation and other publications and manuscripts bearing on historical subjects generally, giving special attention to the collection of historical material relating to our Province. Their collection will therefore be a valuable addition to the books now in the Legislative Library, if an amalgamation is effected. It is not the intention to hold any public meetings of this Society until after it is incorporated and properly organized.

In the meantime the committee will devote their attention to the collection of historical material for their library. With this end in view they have corresponded with a number of persons and with all the kindred Societies of the United States.

The report concludes with acknowledging a number of devotions of historic interest.
