Scandalous Transactions.

ONCE more we call on the Government to say what they propose doing in regard to the cash short in the Land Office, as shown by the Land Commissioners' own statements submitted to the Legislature...

It is now nearly a month since Mr. Shaw in his place in the Legislature called the attention of the Government to the state of the Land Office accounts and charged in plain words that nearly FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS were missing...

The people have not forgotten the cry which was raised in 1889 and 1890 over the Strong defalcations, and the persistent attempt made by Messrs. Davies and Peters to fasten suspicion on Mr. Ferguson...

Besides the money short and unaccounted for, we charge that dishonest, corrupt and scandalous allowances and reductions have been made in the Land Office since the present Government came into power...

Here we have nearly seven hundred dollars given away to thirteen persons in the collection of nine hundred dollars, the average rate of reduction being over 43 per cent. of amount owed!

Mr. Peters has not by this act made a strong supporter of Mr. McEachern, he has mistaken his man. Why not treat others in the same liberal manner?

NEWFOUNDLAND.

Renewal of the Status Quo of 1889.

The announcement that the Government of Newfoundland had consented to a renewal of the status quo of 1889, in order if possible to arrive at a friendly understanding between the two colonies, creates much interest here.

The reader will remember that the scandalous system of corruption inaugurated by Mr. Peters in the Land Office is a matter apart from the \$5,000 cash short and unaccounted for.

Boston Markets.

Boston, May 19. Eggs.—The market holds just about as quoted last week. There is a full supply and a moderate demand. Good fresh Michigan, western and provincial, are generally held at 16c, but some marks have to be sold at 15c and 15 1/2c.

POTATOES.—Receipts have been moderate this week and the old stock has been pretty well cleaned up. Prices for choice fresh Hebons and Burbanks have been ruling a little firmer for the past day or two.

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The result is felt to be entirely due to the firmness and moderation of the Federal authorities, coupled with attention from any action calculated to irritate Newfoundland. No time will be lost on the part of the Dominion Government to carry out its share of the bargain just made, and in a few days it is hoped, will see the all order of things restored.

Indicative of the narrow gauge which Newfoundland has had, it may be stated that the cruiser La Cadienne, before proceeding to Labrador, called at St. John's on Saturday for orders as to the treatment to be accorded to the Newfoundland fishermen in these waters.

She will now be on a message of amity and goodwill.

TORONTO, May 23.—10 a. m. Unsettled, cool and showery.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.) HALIFAX, May 23. Anticosti—A few cod and lobsters at South-west Point and a few herring at Fox Bay, while herring are reported struck in at English Bay.

Quebec—Cod good at Percé, fair at Grand River but poor at Grand Greve and Newport Point. Bankers at latter place from Banks report cod plentiful, herring and lobsters good at Grand River, fair at Newport Point and a few lobsters at Percé; also, a few salmon at Gaspe.

New Brunswick—Herring very plentiful at Carleton and Point Escuminac and Campbellton; fair catches of cod, haddock and sardine at Campbellton.

P. E. Island—Herring and lobsters good from Miramichi to North Cape, and fair at Tignish, Alberton, Goose Harbor and Bloomfield, but poor at Malapan. Cod and lobsters good and a few herring at Georgetown.

Cape Braton—Cod good at St. Ann's, fair at Port Hood and St. Peter's, but poor at Louisbourg and Arichat. Lobsters fair at St. Ann's, Louisbourg and Arichat and a few at Port Hood and St. Peter's. Herring poor at Port Hood and St. Ann's, and a few capercaillie and haddock at Port Hood and Arichat respectively.

Nova Scotia—Cod plentiful at Lockport, good at Liverpool, fair at Canso, Lunenburg and Digby, and a few at Port Laroche. Lobsters fair at Lunenburg, but poor at Canso, Liverpool, Lockport, Port Laroche and Digby. Herring struck in inside of Rose Bay Bank and a few at Lunenburg, Liverpool and Port Laroche. Haddock and herring fair at Lockport, but light at Digby. A few haddock are being taken at Port Laroche.

Bait—Herring bait by fishermen's nets at Boughton Island. Ice procurable at Georgetown and Canso.

A Grievance.

Dennison in Terror.

FOUR WOMEN SHOT DEAD IN ONE NIGHT BY AN UNKNOWN ASSASSIN.

A Dennison, Texas, despatch of May 18th reports: Last night was a night of horror in Dennison. Between 11 o'clock and 3:30 in the morning an assassin brutally and premeditatedly shot and killed four women, two of them leaders of local society and two inmates of a respectable household. The victim was Mrs. M. Haynes, wife of Dr. Henry F. Haynes, one of Dennison's most respected citizens. Five hours later, in the very heart of the city, a beautiful young lady, Miss Teen Hawley, was also shot and killed by some unknown person.
