The By-Elections.

CANDIDATES to support the Government in each of the districts of King's and Queen's Counties for which there are vacancies in the House of Assembly, are in the field.

We congratulate the Liberal-Conservatives of the first district of King's on the selection of J. G. Sterns, Esq. Mr. Sterns is one of those who ought, in the interests of the country, to be in the Legislature of the Province.

The candidate for the third electoral district of Queen's is the popular son of a popular father. The Hon. Francis Kelly was the great friend of the Fort Augustus district, and its representative in the Legislature during many years of political battle for the rights of the people.

The candidate for this city led the poll in the city at the recent election for the House of Commons—though Mr. L. H. Davies was one of the opposition candidates. We have no doubt that the confidence in Mr. Blake, exhibited on that occasion will again be exhibited at the coming election.

No Cause For Joy.

THE Opposition have no cause for joy over the election in Huntingdon. Huntingdon is a Grit stronghold. Mr. Scriver, (the elected candidate) is not a supporter of Unrestricted Reciprocity. To secure his election, in a hive of Grits, he was compelled to repudiate the fact and to say that he would not support a policy which would involve a trade discrimination against the Mother Country.

An exchange says: "More than 3,000 native born citizens have emigrated from Bucks County, Pennsylvania, during the last two years, owing to the difficulty of making a living there." If this exodus were from any part of the Dominion what a "blue run" howl the Grit press would raise.

Senator Howlan.

THE reappointment of Senator Howlan will, we feel sure, be satisfactory to men of both parties in this Province. No one questions the motives which induced Senator Howlan to resign his life position and hazard the chances of an election contest in which the odds were greatly against him.

Notes and Comments.

At the Liberal-Conservative convention in McLeod's Hall yesterday, a resolution thanking Hon. Donald Ferguson for the valuable services rendered by him to the Third Electoral District while he sat as its representative in the Provincial Legislature, was unanimously adopted.

The London Times publishes an article on Congo affairs calling attention to the prohibitory tariff and to the rumors in connection with the Kerkhove expedition, which is now well on its way from Leopoldville with the intention of annexing the Nile valley in King Leopold's name.

The official returns show that the value of goods entered for consumption in the Dominion for the month of February was \$7,616,158, and the duty collected thereon \$1,702,549. For the same month the goods exported from the Dominion were as follows:

Total \$3,331,996. Of this amount, \$3,185,019 was the produce of Canada, and \$146,977 the produce of other countries.

Referring to Mr. Parnell's delegation to the United States, Davitt said: "The gentleman composing Mr. Parnell's delegation to the United States estimate that 30 per cent. of the Irish Americans are supporting Mr. Parnell. This estimate is greatly exaggerated. The number should be nearer 3 per cent. I will not believe that \$4,500 was subscribed at the meeting in Cooper Union last night unless I count the money myself."

Irish Affairs.

Michael Davitt, in an interview on the 20th, contemptuously referred to what he termed Parnell's "bluff." Davitt said he did not intend to be a candidate in an election in the division of Cork city, which Parnell now represents. Two reasons led him to make this decision.

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The Parnellites will not be able to change the situation of affairs in North Sligo. Mr. Parnell's candidate, Alderman Dillon, will be beaten by 2,000 votes. My advice to the workmen is to abstain from strikes for three years, to organize and to increase their funds.

The Pall Mall Gazette, under the heading "Fire Escape Tactics; Parnell Climbs Down," says: "Mr. Parnell has made his first really weak move. Consequently the Parnellites are greatly embarrassed and the patriots are jubilant. Now it is evident the challenge of Mr. Parnell was a mere bluff."

The Dublin Evening Telegraph holds that Parnell's eminence places him above the necessity of noticing Healy's insolence, and says he intends to ignore the designing offensiveness of his enemies.

The Nationalists expect Parnell will not decide whether to accept the challenge until he has learned the issue of the Sligo struggle. If defeated there, they say, he will find some pretext to decline the risk in Cork.

Parnell left Dublin for Sligo on the 20th. His candidate Dillon faces increasing odds. The Parnellite hope that a section of the clergy would refrain from interfering in the campaign has been blasted by the result of the National Federation convention in Sligo.

The Parnellites were holding a meeting at Sligo on the 20th, when they were attacked by anti-Parnellites, who stoned them, pelted them with mud and broke up the meeting. The anti-Parnellites also stoned the police, who came to the assistance of the Parnellites, and a general scrimmage ensued.

The Parnellites are intensely savage over Mr. Gladstone's declaration that home rule will be impossible with Parnell as the Irish leader and renew the cries of English dicta-

tion. On the other hand, the Nationalists rely upon the declaration as enabling the Irish people definitely to recognize the adhesion to Parnell to mean the collapse of the constitutional movement.

Personal.

It is said that Mr. Parnell will marry Mrs. O'Shea in the month of June, and will set up an establishment at Brighton.

Mr. Laffan, of the New York Sun, was the purchaser of a \$4,400 jar at the Ives sale in New York last week, a fact which rather upsets the popular conception of the average newspaper man.

Mary Mulholland, of Ballywalter, County Down, Ireland, died recently, aged 103 years. She attended to her ordinary business up to a few days before her death.
