More Financial Support For APEC Work Emphasized

The urgent need of more membership and more money to work with, was emphasized here yesterday by spokesmen for the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council at the closing business session in the afternoon. It was held in the Prince of Wales College auditorium and was presided over by R. Whidden Gans, president of the organization.

Mr. Gans presided in the absence through illness of R.J. Rankin of Halifax, the president of the organization. Regret was expressed by the meeting at Mr. Rankin's illness and a message and flowers were sent to him at the hospital here where he is recovering from an illness which hospitalized him early Monday morning.

The planned windup session with the Premier's conference was abandoned when it was found to be impractical.

The report of Executive manager, Nelson Mann, indicated that the Council has 577 members but it was explained that an intensive membership drive is underway in the Moncton area and similar drives are planned in other areas in the near future.

PROGRAM CURTAILED

Mr. Mann's report also revealed that the work program which had been planned for 1957 had to be curtailed for lack of funds. A year ago the Council directors had budgeted for an expenditure of more than \$100,000 but the year's expenditure will be about \$72,000.

It was emphasized that APEC's intention is not to duplicate the work of any other organization. It was described as "a venture in co-operation we believe we should press for."

To Launch Second Phase Of Polio Campaign Here

The second phase in the Canada-wide campaign to reduce the incidence of poliomyelitis is expected to get under way in this Province towards the current month.

Official of the local Chapter say that they will cooperate in the latest anti-polio measure by which the Canadian Foundation for Poliomyelitis plan to offer inoculations of Salk Polio Vaccine to all-adult Canadians desirous of obtaining such protection.

The project is now underway in many sections of the nation and will embrace all adult age groups, though aimed particularly at those in the 40-60 bracket.

As in other sections of the country the local Chapter's initial series of adult inoculations will be restricted to large employee groups in the urban communities. Selected firms will be contacted, and the wish of their employees ascertained.

If sufficient numbers of a firm's employees ask for preventive inoculations, the Chapter will provide vaccine and the medical personnel. Clinics will be set in the firm itself, or the nearest adjoining available space.

GOOD RESPONSE

Several local business houses have already been contacted local officials state, adding that the response thus far has been "excellent."

It is the intention of the P.E.I. Chapter to confine this work to the larger urban centres during the Fall and Winter months. Adult anti-polio inoculation clinics are not expected to operate in the provincial rural areas before next spring.

The inoculations will be given in a series of three; The second shot will follow the first by four weeks, and the final inoculation will not be given until a further seven months period has elapsed. The cost to the public will be one dollar per dose per person, the balance being absorbed by the national Foundation.
