DIDN'T GET THE LICENSE.—The Annet's Press says: A curious blunder of a Cumberland county bridegroom this week caused no little consternation among his friends. The hour for the ceremony had arrived, and the guests, numbering almost a hundred, were in attendance, when it was discovered that the groom had neglected to secure a license and none could be obtained within a distance of 18 miles. A fast team was secured, the young man drove the 18 miles and returned, and the wedding took place four hours later than the appointed time. But as the train would not wait the wedding was postponed until the following day.

The Prince of Wales'

Gambling Propensities Condemned.

Action of the Methodist Conference

LONDON, June 13. The storm rising about the head of the Prince of Wales is fast obtaining intensity endangering his chances of succession to the throne, if not the existence of the English monarchy. No class appears to be stirred so deeply as the great middle class, the real strength of the country, and hitherto a solid and stolid prop of the monarchy. Wherever its voice becomes audible its earnest denunciations of the Prince are accompanied by regrets at his nearness to the throne. Representative gatherings of religious bodies, Congregational, Methodist, Baptist, Unitarian and Presbyterian have already recorded their condemnation. The boards of guardians are going out of their accustomed paths to discuss motions branding the gambling propensities of the Prince as a disgrace to the country. Several Liberal societies have adopted protests against his continuance in the army. The agitation has every character of permanence. Ever long the glowing fervor of popular heat must penetrate to the circle of politics, causing party action in and out of Parliament. The Radical members of the House of Commons are opening the attack on the Prince, but they have been warned that Gladstone resents the movement, and that the leaders of the Opposition will be actively shown their repugnance to assenting Liberalism with an agitation tending to cast discredit on the Crown. A group of Radical meeting occurred in the opinion that the leaders had mistaken the feeling of the nation, that even on party grounds it was impossible to neglect the duty to take the sense of Parliament on the position of the Prince of Wales and the others concerned. The Radicals will not be content with anything less than action by the military authorities in voicing the same official reproof of the Prince as Gen. Williams and the Lovett Club support the Prince. He met the heartiest greeting at Ascott races. Sir William Gordon Cummings has been dismissed from the army.

TORONTO, June 13. At the Methodist Conference in session here, Rev. Dr. Douglas strongly condemned the Prince, and Dr. Potts agreed that we must all bow our heads in shame.

Services in Westminster Abbey.

WHO WERE PRESENT.

LONDON, June 13. The memorial service for Sir John A. Macdonald in Westminster Abbey yesterday was highly solemn and impressive and was attended by a large number of prominent persons. Lord Mulgrave represented the Queen, and Gen. Ellis the Prince of Wales. Among the others present were Lord Knutsford and the Right Hon. W. H. Smith, representing the Imperial Government; the Marquis of Lorne, Lord Brassey, Lord Kimberley, Lord Mount Stephen, Lord Aberdeen, Speaker House of Commons, Gen. Laurie, Mr. Colby, Mr. Courtney, Deputy Finance Minister, and various colonial agents resident in London.
