Mr. J. B. Lewis has returned from Wolfville, N. S. where he had been attending the annual Baptist Convention.

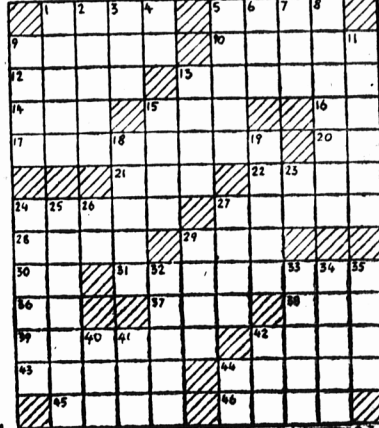
