Mechanic Steals DC-3 Flies It Three Minutes

SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP)—A discharged airplane mechanic who had never flown before stole a DC-3 twin-engine from Sao Paulo airport Thursday and kept it in the air for three minutes.

He crash-landed in a residential neighborhood, narrowly missing a nursery packed with children, and walked away from the wrecked plane with the seat of his trousers torn.

Police said Olimpio Martins was fired Wednesday by Real-Aerovias Airlines and wanted to get even with the company. They gave this account of the incident:

Martins started drinking after he was fired. Early Thursday morning he returned to the airport and saw the empty DC-3 standing on the tarmac ready for service. He climbed in.

The plane was badly damaged. Police quoted Martins as saying he took the plane "for vengeance."

They said when he was asked whether he realized the cost of the craft and the danger involved, he pointed to his torn pants and said: "My trousers are spoiled. Who's going to pay for them? You may not realize it but I bought these trousers on instalments and I just finished paying yesterday."

Planning To Honor Sea-Going Ancestor

TORONTO (CP)—A Vancouver brother and sister plan to honor a sea-going ancestor by sailing a tiny five-man lugger from England to Australia more than 100 years ago.

The United Kingdom information service here said Thursday a plaque, commemorating the voyage of Capt. Richard Nicholls and the crew of the Mystery, is to be unveiled Saturday in the Cornish fishing village of Newlyn, England.

Miss V. May Willis and N. C. K. Willis visited Newlyn last year and arranged for the plaque.

Capt. Nicholls, a grandfather of the Willises, and his crew left Newlyn harbor Nov. 18, 1854, and 116 days later arrived at Melbourne, Australia. The tiny Mystery had a 11-foot beam and drew only six feet of water.

First Seaman To Hear Of 1914 War

TORONTO (CP)—The man who received the first signal to the Royal Navy in 1914 that the First World War had been declared, is to be buried here today.

Patrick O'Hare, 80, veteran of the Boxer rebellion, the Indian frontier wars, Boer War and First World War, died Tuesday at Tottenham, 25 miles northwest of here.

Born in Liverpool, England, he emigrated in 1924 following 32 years service in the Royal Navy.

He was the oldest member of the Royal Canadian Navy during the Second World War, serving as chief yeoman of signals at HMCS York, Toronto lakeshore naval base.

His seven sons all served overseas during the Second World War.

Early Voting Trend Against Gov't In Ceylon

COLOMBO (AP)—Early returns from Ceylon's general election Thursday indicated trouble for Premier Sir John Kotelawala's pro-Western United National party.

Five of Kotelawala's cabinet ministers lost their seats in Parliament to the neutralist People's United Front led by opposition chief Solomon West Ridgway Dias Bandaranaike.

All five held seats that had been considered certain to elect government supporters.

Kotelawala himself was re-elected but with a reduced majority. His chances of forming a new government were greatly weakened.

Bandaranaike's coalition includes Trotskyites and fellow travelers and has Communist support. It is pledged to oust British naval and air bases from this strategic island in the Indian ocean and end Ceylon's link with the crown.
