Causeway Project Backed By Mr. Bell And His Party

Complete endorsement of the proposed causeway project between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island was voiced by Mr. R. R. Bell as he resumed the debate on the Draft Address in the Legislature yesterday.

Mr. Bell recalled that in 1944, he had brought up the subject of a causeway but didn't get much of a reception from the Government side of the house.

Referring to a statement made by the late Premier Jones when he said, "It is not up to me to decide this matter, time alone will tell what the future will hold."

He recalled that in 1944 he presented to the House the estimates of a causeway and bridge and a tunnel. These estimates which had been prepared by Railway engineers indicated the following costs:

Causeway, \$50,000,000 bridge \$77,000,000 tunnel \$100,000,000

Gov't Refuses To Change Potato Offer

OTTAWA (CP) - The government has rejected a recommendation by the Agriculture prices support board that the price paid in a program to divert surplus potatoes into starch factories be raised.

He informed the Commons the government could not accept the board's recommendation to raise the price to \$1.20 from \$1 a 165-pound barrel—about 2 1/2 bushels—for Canada No. 1 grade potatoes.

He said the board was told the government will review the question as the April 30 date approaches. The assistance was provided at the request of New Brunswick potato growers.

Proclaim Daylight Time Council Urges Province

At a special meeting of the City Council held in Council Chambers at City Hall yesterday afternoon a resolution was passed requesting the two Charlottetown Members, Hon. B. Earle MacDonald and Mr. Alexander McIsaac to urge upon the Legislature at its present session that Daylight Saving Time be instituted in this province from late June until Sept. 30.

There was a full attendance of Council members with the exception of Councillor Elmer Macdonald and the meeting was presided over by His Worship Mayor Stewart.

A full discussion of the question was taken part in by the Councilors before the resolution was passed in which it was asserted that the majority of the community were in daylight saving last year and generally speaking the lack of uniformity was the only objectionable feature of the unwieldy Daylight Time was definitely making time and the resolution was worded to avoid this disadvantage.

The full text of the resolution Whereas there exists on the Legislative books of this province a statute known as 'An Act to provide for uniformity of time throughout the Province.'

And whereas in the said Act provision is made for the instituting of Daylight Saving Time (being an hour in advance of Standard Time) by proclamation, by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council by Order - in - Council.

And whereas our summer season is of short duration, and whereas the majority of town dwellers in the Province are favourable to the instituting of Daylight Saving Time during the Summer months.

And whereas Daylight Saving Time provides a longer evening for urban dwellers to engage in the beautification of their homes and gardens etc.

And whereas Daylight Saving Time would provide further opportunity for office employees and others in a like position to engage in healthful exercises or take other benefits which would be denied them if standard time remains in effect.

And whereas this Province is doing all in its power to encourage the tourist trade, and the majority of our tourists are accustomed to and prefer Daylight Saving Time, and their wishes should be given consideration.

Therefore be it resolved in the interests of uniformity and better urban-rural relations - that this Council request the two Charlottetown members, namely the Honourable B. Earle MacDonald and Mr. Alexander McIsaac, to urge upon the Legislature at its present session that Daylight Saving Time be instituted in this Province from (Continued on page 2 col. 3)

Find Missing Helicopter; Crew Safe

HALIFAX (CP)—A search plane spotted a missing RCAF helicopter 15 miles northwest of Knob Lake, Que., late Thursday and the three crew members of the downed aircraft were reported uninjured.

The air force said the three men were Sgt. T. A. Causey of Ottawa, the pilot; Cpl. J. E. Damours of Riviere du Loup, Que., and LAC. J. W. G. Skerry of Port Williams, N. S.

They were said to be suffering slightly from exposure. The helicopter, which disappeared from its Knob Lake base Tuesday afternoon, was found by one of two Dakotas conducting a night search of the area.

They were attracted to the downed plane by three flares fired by the stranded airman. The search plane circled the spot until another helicopter from Knob Lake arrived to complete the rescue.

The copter was last heard from Tuesday afternoon while trying to return to Knob Lake from a local flight. The pilot reported heavy snow squalls and difficulty in finding the airfield.
