

Britain Enlarges Trade Ties With Western Europe

LONDON (CP) — Quietly, almost with a suggestion of stealth, Britain is edging towards tighter trade links with western Europe. Ultimately she may join a proposed European "free trade" zone.

What is happening, briefly, is that the British government is considering the feasibility of associating itself with a project for a common market being drafted by the Netherlands, Belgium, France, Germany, Italy and Luxembourg.

The free trade area, which might take 10 years to become a functioning reality, would involve progressive elimination of internal tariffs among member countries, but would leave them free to set their own external tariffs. Thus if Britain joined, her Commonwealth preferential arrangements would not be directly affected.

Afghanistan Gets Communist Arms

NEW DELHI (AP) — Afghanistan is getting between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000 worth of arms from the Communist world, according to a diplomatic report reaching New Delhi Monday from the Afghan capital of Kabul.

The sources said they understood Afghanistan has placed \$13,000,000 worth of orders with Czechoslovak arms manufacturers and \$7,000,000 to \$10,000,000 worth with the Soviet Union.

TORONTO (CP) — A 14-year-old boy was remanded Monday to Oct. 1, charged with delinquency in the slaying of Wayne Mallette, 7. Police said he will not be charged with murder.

Wayne's body was found under a clump of bushes in the Canadian National Exhibition grounds here Sept. 16.

He had been choked by a person with insufficient strength to break bones in the neck.

A 14-year-old boy, found huddled in the basement of the apartment block where he lives, was arrested Friday.

Sec'y Of Council Of Europe Dies

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — Leon Marchal, 56, secretary general of the Council of Europe, died Monday at his home after a long illness.

Marchal began his diplomatic career as consul in Montreal in 1929. He was director of the Middle East section at the foreign ministry when the Council of Europe picked him up as secretary general three years ago.

Leaves have their time to fall, and flowers to wither at the North Wind's breath. And stars to set, but all things have all seasons for their own. O Death! Though the Master of life and death reminds us in the Gospel: "The day of the Lord shall come like a thief in the night," the news of the sudden and unexpected death of a friend invariably brings an unbidden pang of sorrow to the human heart. This was especially true on Saturday the 9th of June, when the residents of Vernon and vicinity were shocked and saddened to learn of the accidental death at Port Hardy, B.C., of Alfred James Murphy.

The remains were flown from Port Hardy to the Bell Funeral Home in Vancouver from where they were transported by motor hearse to Our Lady of Sorrows Church where the funeral Mass was celebrated by Rev. D.L. Campbell, who also conducted services at the grave.
