#### Sunday Walk Is Restful

We, doubt if anywhere, more touching history is to be read than in visiting the remains of a farm-home one where, for the most part now, only the shades of times long gone walk the silent yard-paths about. Such a place we visited yesterday, coming to it almost accidentally in the Sabbath-day's walk which had taken us along near and more distant fields.

At Alderlea such excursions on foot are considered to be among the most pleasant of our outings. And this was no exception to the rule. It came at a suggestion of the younger farmer which at once lit up the faces of the children, both his own and Jamie and Gage who as it happened were our afternoon guests. We decided to accompany them if only to find, as we knew we should, trails that with our own youngster's we once well knew.

Gently the peace and loveliness of an October Sunday blessed the countryside with its reverent charm. So sunny it was about, and afar the day draped dainty violet-hunted scarves along the crests of the hills.

Granddaughter, a demure lass felt it her duty to remind Gage and Mack to honor well the day. "This is Sunday - remember!" she said recalling them more than once to its solemnity when fresh young laughs rang out in the silences we walked in, from pure exuberance of spirits or some antic of the dogs our attendants on the way.

Along a pasture we first turned our steps, and then on land where once-clear fields are now

being fast reclaimed by the woodlands. Gay little plantations of spruces have taken root there, and graceful white birches and odd maples-and alders to make it fragrant and beautiful. The "wild" grass was like virgin to walk upon.

"There once was a wood-road somewhere about here" the young farmer said when we came to a woodland we would enter. He smiled. "The old mare and I used to know it pretty well, when we snarled rabbits together." Mack's eyes widened at the intriguing thought.

Into its dimness we presently walked, along the now mossy and spruce-needed windings where at times tall trees almost barred the wagon-road of once and only odd sunbeams could stray. Squirrels, hauled the lads blithely, and more than one likely storehouse was explored before almost blinded for the moment by the sudden brightness we emerged to the sunshine of a meadow again.

"Now let's walk to the top of that rise," one proposed "and look out over the country from there."

Quiet, indeed lonely fields, stretched away from our feet, banded by the dark of acres of woodlands which wait there at the rear of the farms; in the distance humes sat in Sunday content. The Highway was marked by the flight of machines. A Church spire flashed white in the sunlight. What an enchanting scene it all was!

We found the remains of the farm-home later, the site it seemed a lone but sacred spot in the midst of its still smiling fields.

### Little U. S. Island Has Unknown Visitors

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — Little Diomed Island, a Bering Sea rock speck which is the United States' nearest possession to Russia, apparently had visitors during the summer, the Alaska native service reported Friday.

Director Bill Olsen said the visit was disclosed in a report by Carroll Hughes, general foreman of the bureau's Nome office.

The island's population of about 90 Eskimos deserts Little Diomed in the summer to obtain jobs on the mainland.

Hughes spent from Sept. 24 until Oct. 7 on Little Diomed getting the island's school ready for return of its inhabitants. Little Diomed is only three miles from Russian-owned Big Diomed.

Hughes said he found cigarettes different than any he had ever seen before and "writing on some paper that looked foreign to me."

The school's food supply had been opened and a lot of it consumed, Hughes reported. Every dish had been used, and not one had been washed.

### LET'S EAT

#### Egg Dishes That Make Good Dinner Entrees

The Chef and I spent a fascinating day visiting poultry farms in New Jersey with Professor John Taylor, poultry specialist from Rutgers University, as our guide.

Few poultrymen produce both hatching eggs and baby chicks. Nello Melini, at his huge hatchery farms (13 million chicks per year) near Vineland, N.J., uses only eggs from pedigreed chickens, in New Hampshire, that produce heavy meaty birds.

POULTRY PIONEER

We visited Pioneer Demme, of Dembro Poultry Farm, who pioneered in raising better poultry and specializes in raising only white leghorns. He has won many prizes for his scientific and careful breeding program and the fine quality of the eggs he sells to hatcheries.

We stopped in the packing house to watch the eggs being sorted for size and perfection. If they were too small or overlarge, they were put on sale; if cracked they were

sold at less than the price of fresh eggs; and if badly cracked, they were broken into containers, covered, refrigerated and sold at a low price.

FOOD BUDGET

A steady stream of customers came to buy these money-savers — encouraging proof that, in spite of increased incomes, millions of homemakers still keep a watchful eye on the food budget.

Eggs can be used occasionally as a main dish at dinner.

EGG ENTRE DINNER: Fresh vegetable soup, Eggs au Gratin or Eggs benedict, Grilled Tomato halves, Broccoli Vinaigrette, Lemon snow, Frozen strawberries, Coffee, tea, milk.

Eggs Au Gratin: Cut 9 hard-

cooked eggs in halves. Make 2 e. medium-thick white sauce. Add 1/2 c. grated sharp Cheddar, 3 drops Tabasco, 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire and 1/2 c. sliced stuffed olives optional.

Butter a low qt. baking dish. Put in a layer of eggs. Cover with sauce and repeat.

Spread with 1/2 c. fine bread crumbs moistened with melted butter. Bake 20 min. at 375 degrees F. This recipe will serve 6.

Eggs Benedict: To prepare, you will need Hollandaise sauce, 6 neat slices broiled or sauteed ham, 3 split English muffins that have been toasted and buttered, 6 poached eggs.

To assemble, top each muffin half with ham. Add a poached egg and spread with Hollandaise. Garnish of sliced ripe olives. Serves 6.

Real Hollandaise Sauce from the Chef: Stir 1/2 c. butter with 1 tsp. flour until creamy, in a small

### Women Try To Double Their Number In U. S. Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ever since a Montana suffragette broke the sex barrier exactly 40 years ago and was elected to Congress, women have brightened the rank of U.S. lawmakers.

In this year's general election they're trying to double their strength in Congress. They're out to add another U.S. senator and capture 28 seats in the House of Representatives.

The feminine contingent in the outgoing Congress—a record number—includes one senator, Maine Republican Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith, whose term runs to 1961, and 14 members of the House of Representatives—eight Democrats and six Republicans.

Almost half of the 50 women who got into Congress in the years since Jeannette Rankin 36-year-old Republican suffragette from Montana paved the way in 1916, were appointed to unexpired terms or rode in on the coattails

of husbands who died in office and virtually bequeathed them the seats.

**ON THEIR OWN**

The trend nowadays, though, is toward straightaway campaigning against men in increasing numbers of districts.

This November, women are seeking Congress seats in 23 states. Eighteen states have one woman Congress candidate each. New York has three and California, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and West Virginia have two each.

Two campaigns for House seats this year—one in Idaho and one in Illinois—are pitting woman against woman.

In the really rough all-female Idaho battle, red-haired Mrs. Gracie Post (pronounced post), is seeking her third term against another farmer's daughter, Miss Louise Shaddock, a first campaigner.

Mrs. Post, 50, is known as "hell's belle" because of her vigorous support of a Hell's Canyon dam to harness Snake River, the boundary between Idaho and Oregon.

In Illinois 64-year-old Mrs. Marquerite Church is running for her fourth term against the wife of a university professor, Mrs. Helen Benson Lays.

**CARTONIST RUNS**

A couple of newcomers—male—are giving two other women veterans a run in this election.

Bill Mauldin, 35-year-old cartoonist of New City, N.Y., famous for his drawings of sad sack soldiers, is using an old jeep and his artistic talents against Mrs. Katharine St. George of Tuxedo
