CBC Group Declares Creativity Is Stifled

OTTAWA (CP)—A group of 10 CBC announcers says creativity in the corporation is being stifled and it could turn into a "fat self-perpetuating, self-servicing bureaucratic Goliath."

The views are outlined in a brief released here, to the Fowler commission on broadcasting by the 10 CBC staff announcers. The commission, set up last summer under R. M. Fowler of Montreal who headed a previous royal commission into broadcasting, is expected to report this spring.

The role of the CBC vis-a-vis private broadcasting is expected to be a main item in the report. This was a main factor in the announcers' brief. It is the only brief to the commission to be made public, aside from three outlines by CBC President J. Alphonse Oulmet, Dr. Andrew Stewart, chairman of the Board of Broadcast Governors, and Don Jamieson, president of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters.

The announcers backed Mr. Oulmet's suggestion for long-term financing, up to 10 years at a time, for the CBC to keep it free "from partisan political

influence." The corporation now operates on yearly financing from Parliament.

ABUSE OF PUBLIC FUNDS
Continued competition in the advertising field with private broadcasters is an "abuse of public funds," the announcers said.

The CBC was created to serve the diverse desires and needs of the whole Canadian community, not primarily as a service to advertisers.

"Public money is used to prepare and present commercial programs but the benefits that accrue to the advertiser are often out of all proportion to the benefits that accrue to the public."

More than half of the 4,000-word brief discusses growing bureaucracy within the corporation. "With the growth of middle bureaucracy in the CBC, organization men have made unprecedented inroads on the broadcast level."

Because of the need for creativity in broadcasting, "when bureaucratic attitudes, standards and routines are imposed on the broadcaster an inferior performance and product result."

"... If the corporation has seemed to grow more and more timid except for sporadic outbursts of sensationalism, it can probably be attributed to the growth of the organization man's influence and the fact that he fears controversy and involvement."

"The solution is to separate the creative program personnel from the bureaucracy. A veritable moat is needed. Broadcasting authority and responsibility should be given back to the trained and dedicated broadcasters."

Such a concept would mean giving creative personnel "the opportunity of being bad," the brief notes. "When men reach for the stars, they sometimes fall on their faces... but sometimes they grab a star."

Organization of "clear lines of control from the top" prevent bad, dangerous or controversial programs from getting on the air, but also kill the creative spark, the brief added.

The real purpose of the CBC was to produce programs. "A projection of recent trends would suggest that, some time in the not too distant future, the CBC will be a fat self-perpetuating, self-servicing bureaucratic Goliath with no final product."

Oromocto, N.B. Will Receive 90-Bed Hospital

OTTAWA (CP)—The government plans to build a 90-bed hospital in the town of Oromocto, N.B., in which 40 beds will be designated for armed forces personnel at nearby Camp Gagetown, Associate Defence Minister, Cadieux said Wednesday.

He said in a written reply to questions in the Commons by Chester MacCue (PC - York-Sunbury) that financing arrangements have not yet been worked out.

Mr. Cadieux also said oil now is being used in place of coal in the central heating plant at Camp Gagetown, pending a decision on whether coal will be used again.
