

No Trace Found Of Missing Girl

No trace has yet been found of Eileen Faye Williams, missing in the Montague area for 18 days now, after she left the house in Charlottetown, Montague on Aug. 6, with the intention of hitch-hiking to her home at Beach Point.

The girl, last seen on the Wood Islands Hill about 6 p.m. in Montague, had previously been working in Hamilton, Ontario and was visiting her parents in this province.

Inquiries are being conducted in Ontario in an effort to locate her.

The following is a detailed description of this girl: Age 19, height 5'4", weight 100 pounds, slight build, dark brown hair, fair complexion, wearing green sweater, black slacks with white stripes, black running shoes and carrying a large brown handbag and a small transistor radio in a brown leather case.
