OTTAWA (CP)—Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation said Thursday the number of dwelling units for which National Housing Act loans were approved dropped to 27,533 during the first half of 1956—a decline of 6,000 from the corresponding period of 1955. However, the decline in NHA lending in 1956 had not yet made its full impact on housing starts by the middle of the year, the corporation said in a quarterly report. There has been speculation that the number of starts may drop this year for the first time since 1951. Expenditures on new residential construction rose 12 per cent to \$72,000,000 from the corresponding period last year. About one-third of the increase was due to higher prices, CMHC said. Almost all of it was brought about by expenditures on privately-initiated housing.

Toronto Gains On Montreal In 5-Years Since Census

OTTAWA (CP)—Toronto, Canada's second-largest metropolitan centre, is steadily moving closer in population to the country's biggest, Montreal. This year's census-takers found that Metropolitan Toronto, on the strength of phenomenal suburban growth, had increased by 20.6 per cent to 1,347,905 persons in a five years since it was counted at 1,117,470 in 1951. Metropolitan Montreal grew 14 per cent to 1,595,327 persons to hold its first place, up from 1,395,400.

To Commission H.M.C.S. Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—HMCS Ottawa, the third of Canada's new anti-submarine destroyer escorts will be commissioned Nov. 10 at Canadian Vickers Ltd., Montreal, the navy announced Thursday. Shortly after the commissioning, the 2,800-ton Ottawa will sail for Halifax to join her sister ships, the St. Laurent and Assiniboine, in the Third Canadian Escort Squadron.
