THE Picnic of St. James' Sabbath School at West River to-day was, notwithstanding the unpleasant state of the weather, well attended.

WE ARE glad to see that Deputy Sheriff Curtis has so far recovered from the injuries sustained in his attempt to re-arrest the prisoner Donnelly, that he is able to attend to his regular business.

A TEAM of the Charlottetown Engineers are to-day engaged in a shooting match at Kensington, with a team of Captain McRae's Co. The contest has so far been very close.

AQUATIC.—Wallace Ross of St. John has accepted the challenge of Warren Smith for a three mile race on Bedford Basin. The date he fixes is August 26th.

A VEGETABLE CURIOSITY is exhibited in the window of Mr. A. Gorman's fish depot, on North Market Street consisting of a radish, giving the almost perfect shape of a human hand, attached to a good representation of an arm.—St. John Telegraph.

THE schooner *Lizzie and Emma*, of this port, picked up, forty miles off Sable Island, two sailors who were adrift in a dory since the 10th. They were landed at Sheet Harbor.

WE are pleased to see that the militia authorities of the Dominion have confirmed Francis S. Longworth in his rank of Captain, Q. F. O., of No. 3 Company, 82nd Battalion, from the date of his appointment, viz., 2nd July, 1875. We congratulate Captain Longworth.

A LEAD of silver, which promises to prove valuable, has been discovered near St. Ann's, Victoria County, P. Q., by a coal cutter in humble circumstances.

THE steamer *Progress* has gone to Anticosti to search for and tow to Quebec the disabled steamer *Lake Champlain*. A tug has also been ordered to go from Father Point to render assistance.

REV. J. P. LEWIS, of Toronto, is on a three weeks' tour through the Maritime Provinces, which will include visits to Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

THE Rev. George Spott, Minister of the Parish of North Berwick, the Delegate from the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, will arrive in this city this evening, and is expected to preach in some of the Presbyterian churches to-morrow; and, probably, to address a public meeting next week on the work of the Church of Scotland and the relation of that Church to the Presbyterians in Canada.

THE Rev. Mr. Christie, Missionary in Trinidad, is expected to preach in St. James' Church to-morrow evening, and refer to the work in his mission field.

A CARGO OF CORN—the first for a number of years—may be seen landing at Walker's wharf, to be ground at the mill of Andrew Moffatt, Esq., who has all the appliances for kiln-drying, grinding, barreling, &c. The mill has been lying comparatively idle for a number of years. It is very agreeable to see it in operation once more.—St. John Sun.

BIG POTATO.—We were shown this morning a large potato, grown in the garden of Mr. George Hooper, Euston Street, which measured round its length ten inches, and round its width seven-and-a-half inches. This is considered an extraordinarily large potato so early in the season. It is of the early rose variety.

IT IS UNDERSTOOD that the second court-martial relative to the iron clad *Grosser Kurfirst* disasters, condemned several of the officers to two years' imprisonment in the fortress, and to be dismissed; one officer, however, whom authorities consider culpable, has escaped conviction, and it is therefore possible that the Emperor will order a third trial.

MR. WASHINGTON FRIND, a painter of merit, and who has an extended reputation in Great Britain, is in Ottawa, for the purpose of interviewing the Minister of Agriculture regarding the exhibition of a panorama throughout the towns and cities of Great Britain, illustrating Canadian scenes, to be accompanied by a lecturer, setting forth the advantage of this Dominion as a field for immigration. It is not likely, however, that any finance assistance can be given at present for the encouragement of any such enterprise.

On the 17th a terrific thunder storm passed over Ottawa. During the storm a man named Arthur Young, who was working in Mr. Penley's garden, Wellington street, took shelter in a barn, which was soon after struck by lightning. The man was knocked senseless, the clothing stripped from his left side, which was severely burned, the course of the electric fluid being marked by a red line extending from his shoulder to his left foot. He is expected to recover.
