Pictou Man Is Awaiting Sentence Here

The meeting presided over by Mr. MacGregor was held in the Willow Street Little Theatre.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says except for a few light snowflurries, precipitation had ended in the Maritimes late Wednesday evening. The last disturbance was rapidly moving towards the Strait of Belle Isle, having deposited over one and a half inches of rain along the south coast of Nova Scotia, with lesser amounts elsewhere in the Maritimes. Little snow was left on the ground in Nova Scotia but from three to six inches lay over much of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Regional forecasts: Prince Edward Island: Cloudy; occasional snowflurries; colder; west winds 20 becoming gusty by evening. Low-high at Charlottetown 24 and 30.
