The Earl of Dudley is again prostrated with his old malady of partial insanity, with which he was attacked a few days ago.

An official denial is made of a rumor that the Marquis of Lorne will resign the Governor-Generalship of Canada at the end of three years, and return home.

Still another rumor about the price paid Lord Beaconsfield by the Longmans for the copyright of 'Eadymon' puts it at £30,000. *Vanity Fair* says this, but it is altogether unlikely.

It is understood that when Parliament assembles Mr. Gladstone will propose a grant of £25,000 to General Sir Frederic Roberts, the hero of Candahar, for his military services in Afghanistan.

There is six inches of snow on the ground in the State of Maine. Trains have been delayed by the storms that have raged.

Hon. Edward Blake was on Tuesday made the recipient of an address at the hands of the Reform Association of the West Riding of York, Ontario.

We understand that Hon. Peter Mitchell has been lying ill at his residence in Montreal for the last fortnight. Mr. Mitchell has the sympathy of a host of friends in our Province.—*Sun*.

Rhubarb Shippers, including Buc-touche and Cocagne, sent out this summer 56 vessels of 23,218 tons, and carrying 21,383,346 feet of deals, etc. The shipments, with the exception of two cargoes to France, were all to ports in the United Kingdom.

A Parisian Scandal has been revived by the prosecution of the publishers of a Paris newspaper by General DeCissey, at one time Minister of War, for defamatory libel. The libel was that Gen. DeCissey was dominated during his term of office by a siren in the person of a German Countess. Such was conclusively proved to have been the case. An investigation into the management of the ex-Minister's department will take place.

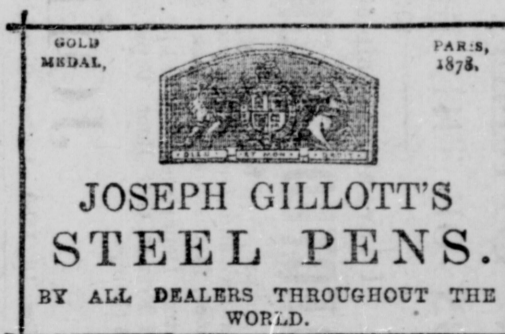
