

RCMP Transfers Announced Here

Supt. A. S. McNeil, officer commanding "L" Division Royal Canadian Mounted Police announced yesterday three transfers affecting personnel of the "L" Division.

Sgt. C. E. Walper has been transferred from "L" Division headquarters (CIB Readers) in Fredericton, N.B. He will be succeeded here by Sgt. M. R. DeKouchay of Fredericton.

Sgt. Walper has 18 years service with the force and is married with two children.

Cpl. R. C. Pettitt, NCO in charge of the Alberton detachment of "L" Division has been transferred to "H" Division at Halifax and will be in charge of the detail at the International Airport there. He will be succeeded here by Cpl. G. Reid from the airport detail at Halifax.

Cpl. Pettitt was born in Manitoba and has been at Alberton since 1960. He is married and has five children. He joined the force in 1951.

Cpl. W. L. Davis, stationed in Charlottetown with "L" Division, has been transferred to "J" Division, Fredericton, N.B., in charge of the detail at Tabusintac. He will be succeeded here by Cpl. C. L. Wentzell of "J" Division, Tabusintac.

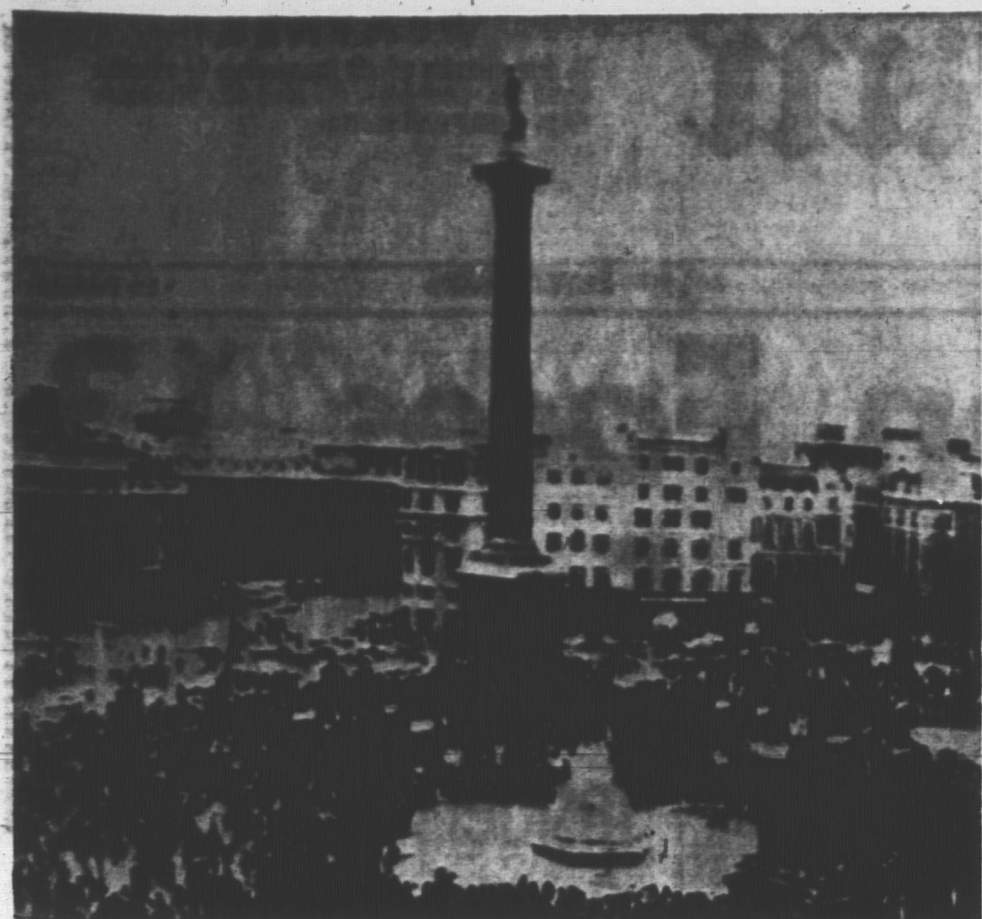
Plans were discussed regarding an "Open House" for the May meeting when a door prize will be given.

Police Course Opens Today

Police of Prince Edward Island's town and villages begin a four-day training period this morning at the RCMP headquarters, "L" Division, Charlottetown.

Instructions open at 8:30 and continue through until Friday evening.

The agenda for the course has been prepared on the instructions and approval of Supt. A. S. McNeil, officer commanding "L" Division.

A wide variety of subjects will be discussed and instructors will include various members of the RCMP, City Police Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC, and Queen's County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC.

Today's topics will include preservation of evidence at the scene of crime, criminal law, first aid. In addition, the students will hear an address by the attorney-general or his deputy and will participate in range practice.

Today's sessions will conclude at 5:30 p.m.

Three Art Sessions Planned For Teachers

Three sessions on art, available to teachers attending the annual convention, will be held in the Lecture Theatre at the Confederation Centre Wednesday and Thursday.

These sessions have been arranged by Monicriff Williamson, curator of the Confederation Art Gallery; Dr. Kenneth Parker, superintendent of city schools, and Anna Riley, secretary of the P.E.I. Teacher's Federation.

The first will be given by Mr. Williamson on Wednesday April 21, 2-4 p.m. the second by Mrs. James Lapsley on Thursday 22nd 9-11 a.m., and the third by Mrs. Peggy Smith, Mrs. Carolyn Kellner, and Mrs. Williamson 2-4 p.m. the same day in the Lecture Theatre at the Confederation Theatre. Those attending should come to the main box office entrance and you will be directed to the lecture theatre.

As a general introduction Mr. Williamson will talk about development in art on the island, and show UNESCO slides of children's art classes at work.

Mrs. James Lapsley will show her slide lecture on Color in Painting as she does in the schools. She will follow this with a short illustrated talk on papilo printing and writing patterns. Examples of this type of work will be exhibited.

ORDINARY OBJECTS Mrs. Peggy Smith will show some of the ordinary household objects she uses in her lessons, and demonstrate the use of Papier Mache. Mrs. Williamson will introduce the use of simple materials in the making of animals for young children. Mrs. Carolyn Kellner will talk on the proportions of the face and body with drawings. There will also be examples of work done by children at the centre.

The teaching staff has compiled notes for all age levels and

hope that these will be of some use to teachers during the next year. The notes will be handed out with spare copies for teachers unable to attend at sessions 2 and 3.

Grade teachers may not have the time or the materials to try out all these ideas, but they may find a few of the projects helpful. The materials used are in many cases scraps and discarded brought from home, and in all cases available and inexpensive.

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Easter Seals Donors From Far Afield
