Report Sub Off Coast Of N.S.

HALIFAX (CP) — Ships and planes searched an area 130 miles off the Nova Scotia coast Friday for "a possible submarine contact" but no identification had been made at dusk.

Neptune late Friday afternoon, but no further contacts had been reported.

NOT U.S. OR BRITISH No United States or British submarines were operating in the area at the time.

A usually reliable source said it was believed to be a Russian sub, but naval officials said this was only speculation. "We're not even sure it's a submarine," they said.

An RCAF Neptune patrol plane reported what it suspected to be a Russian carrier aircraft on the coast of the Atlantic on Friday. The plane was on a routine exercise at the time.

Queen And Duke Greeted By Cheering Stockholm Crowds

STOCKHOLM (Reuters) — Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh came ashore from their yacht Friday in a blue and gold Swedish royal barge rowed by 14 naval cadets pulling 182-year-old oars.

What was square in the back and softly rounded at the front, and trimmed with narrow twisted strands of red and green to match her coat.

Cheering from the huge crowd rang over the harbor as the Queen and the Duke stepped on to the red-carpeted landing stage in brilliant sunshine to open their state visit to Sweden.

There were no incidents. It was estimated that 50,000 Swedes jammed the waterfront before the royal palace to see the British sovereign. Another 250,000 lined the streets to witness the opening state drive and there may have been almost as many peering out of windows or perched on rooftops.

Queen Elizabeth kissed queen Louise and other members of the Swedish royal family. For a few moments the British couple chatted on the landing stage with the Swedish royalty, and then shook hands with Prime Minister Tage Erlander and members of his government and diplomatic representatives.

As one veteran court official explained privately: "They are so young and bright and they are the springtime of royalty."

Elizabeth inspected a guard of honor of naval cadets and then, accompanied by king Gustaf, drove off in an open carriage between lines of soldiers presenting arms.

What was not mentioned was that Sweden's king is 74 and his father before him was 93.

Elizabeth was wearing a fitted white silk coat printed with sprays of pink flowers. Her white silk hat

CONDITION IS SATISFACTORY

Possible Major Operation Confronting Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's doctors reported Friday that his condition "is progressing satisfactorily," with "no indication for immediate surgery." This announcement was made shortly before 10 p.m. A.D.T. The staff of physicians attending the stricken president did not rule out the possibility of surgery later.

"There is no indication for immediate surgery." The bulletin was signed at Walter Reed by Maj. Gen. Howard Snyder, White House physician, and Maj. Gen. Leonard Heaton, the hospital commandant. James C. Hagerty, White House press secretary, also listed as on hand for the exhaustive consultations. Dr. Paul Dudley White of Boston, hearty specialist who has been on the Eisenhower case since he suffered a heart attack last Sept. 24, and Col. Thomas Mattingly, chief heart specialist at Walter Reed.

Six other physicians took part in the consultations, including Lt. Col. Walter Tkach, assistant White House physician. The news that Eisenhower had again fallen ill stirred great and widespread concern. Some apprehension arose that perhaps he had had another heart attack such as the one which laid him up for

weeks last fall and threatened to remove him from the political picture. But all day, the medical reports relayed by Hagerty laid great emphasis on the statement that this is not a heart case. Hagerty said the doctors wanted to underscore that. Reporters asked Hagerty to ask the doctors flatly whether it would be proper to call Eisenhower's condition "critical." He came back with the report soon after 6 p.m. A.D.T. that they said it "would be wrong to use the word 'critical' at this time."

As for using the word "serious," Hagerty said he would have to wait for further word but that he himself was not using any adjectives. AN ACUTE ILLNESS Dr. Paul Dudley White, Boston heart specialist and one of four civilian physicians and surgeons called in, said before flying to Washington that his information would not lead him to "feel the president is too sick."

Former Imperial Oil Manager Dies

HALIFAX (CP) — Sidney Smith Shatford, former manager of Imperial Oil Limited in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island died in hospital here Friday following a short illness. Mr. Shatford, 52, retired in 1930 after serving as district manager for 45 years. Survivors include two sons, W. W. Shatford is the Imperial Oil Maritime manager, and J. E. Shatford is with the company in Toronto.

P.M. Appeals For Passage of Supply Bill

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister St. Laurent Friday appealed to Opposition parties to permit a speedy passage of an interim supply bill to replenish the "virtually exhausted" federal treasury. However, Opposition leader Drew said the prime minister first should inform the Commons whether the government plans to adjourn Parliament soon for the summer. He said a decision on adjournment would have a "very definite bearing" upon the voting of interim supply without examination of departmental appropriations.

MR. BEAUDOIN SHOWS NO EMOTION

Speaker Censure Motion Defeated By 109-35 Vote

OTTAWA (CP) — The House of Commons, split on party lines, voted 109 to 35 Friday to defeat an unprecedented motion of censure against Speaker Rene Beaudoin made a week ago by Opposition leader Drew. The 44-year-old Speaker sat motionless, showing no emotion, as the House voted—Liberal and Social Credit parties to sustain him, and Progressive Conservative and CCF parties to back the motion that the Speaker's actions in the momentous gas-pipeline battle had subordinated the Commons' rights to the government's will.

Mr. St. Laurent made no reply. Earlier, however, Health Minister Martin said the Opposition was trying to force on the people an "unnecessary" election which would not resolve the issue. The Opposition did not care whether Speaker-like, they pull down the Speaker's chair and the pillars of the Commons.

Island Firms Are Hopeful Of Supplying Gagetown Camp

Prince Edward Island produce dealers hope to be among those who will supply rations to the troops in training at Camp Gagetown this summer. Several firms have submitted tenders for the supplying of potatoes, eggs, milk, butter, poultry, canned potatoes, and other agricultural products. Feeding 10,000 troops in summer training at Camp Gagetown will be the country's largest single catering job this year.

When the House adjourned for the weekend at 8 p.m., Mr. St. Laurent said "we could not suggest an adjournment after having obtained only one month's supply."

It had been the government's intention, he said, to suggest a summer adjournment of Parliament. But what had taken place was of such a character that we shall have to reconsider whether or not it would be possible to make that suggestion.

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Dmitri Shepilov, new Soviet foreign minister, is going to visit Cairo, it was officially announced Friday. Shepilov has been officially invited by the Egyptian government, the Soviet news agency Tass said.

CONFIRM DIAGNOSIS

The original diagnosis of the president's case, by White House physician Howard Snyder, was illitis, or an inflammation of the lower section of the small intestine. A later hospital bulletin in which Snyder participated said this was confirmed by examination.

Hagerty was asked whether inflammation in this spot is normally accompanied by an obstruction. He said the doctors said or that it is a possibility.

He said Eisenhower vomited several times before it was decided to take him to the hospital, but not afterwards. He said the president seemed to be in good spirits and had taken several cat naps during the day.

Hagerty was unable to say what might have caused the obstruction the doctors reported. He said Eisenhower had similar, but not identical, attacks in 1949 and 1953.
