

Ike Delock Notches 12th Win; Yankees Bop Chisox

Ike Delock, Boston's converted relief specialist, bore down in the clutch for his 12th victory Friday as Boston's Red Sox edged Cleveland Indians 4-3.

In other American League action, New York staged a comeback to down Chicago White Sox 5-5.

Pittsburgh's third-place Pirates rapped out 13 hits, including a two-run homer by Hank Foiles to whip Chicago Cubs 6-2 in a National League encounter.

NINE HITS
Chunky Ike Delock gave up nine hits, including Rocky Colavito's 29th homer with none on in the ninth to go the distance for the sixth time in 12 starts since coming out of the bullpen.

Boston's Frank Malzone aided the cause with his 12th homer of the season in the fourth.

The loser was one-time relief star with the New York Giants, Hoyt Wilhelm.

The Yanks blew a three-run

lead, then knocked Early Wynn out of the box in the seventh and went on to score four runs and claim their victory.

The win increased the Bombers' lead in the AL to 12½ games. Mickey Mantle blasted his 36th homer in the first inning, and Elston Howard hit his 10th with one on in the second.

TAKE THE LEAD
The Sox pecked away and with Sherman Lollar's 17th homer in the sixth, they moved in front.

Duke Maas replaced Yankee starter Johnny Kucks during the uprising, and got credit for his seventh win.

Following the rally, Gil McDougald homered in the eighth, his 12th of the year, to sew it up.

The Pirates' game was a celebration of the renewal of manager Danny Murtaugh's contract.

Shortly before the game, Pirates general manager Joe L. Brown announced that Murtaugh had agreed to lead the Pirates

through 1959.

The Cubs responded with their 63rd triumph of the season, one more than they scored all last year.

Rookie George Witt collected his seventh win.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Gene Woodling's leadoff home run in the sixth inning and clutch pitching by Connie Johnson and Jack Harshman enabled Baltimore Orioles to defeat Detroit Tigers 2-1 Friday night.

Johnson, earning his sixth victory in 13 verdicts, gave up 12 hits before being relieved by Harshman in the eighth.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ralph Terry, 22-year-old Kansas City right hander, pitched an one-hitter Friday night as the Athletics nosed out Washington 1-0. A single by his pitching rival, Russ Kemmerer, in the third inning deprived Terry of a perfect no-hit game as he mowed down all

27 other batters he faced without interruption.

The Senators, blanked by Terry twice before during this season, lofted only nine balls to the outfield, not counting Kemmerer's hit. Kemmerer was only slightly less brilliant than Terry as he lost on a five-hit performance. A two-out triple by Bob Cerv and a double by Harry Simpson gave the A's the only run they needed in the third inning.

TORONTO (CP)—Central Ontario athletes dominated competition Friday in the interprovincial track and field championships at the Canadian National Exhibition.

They won six of the 17 events, scored seven seconds and four thirds. Nine provincial groups competed. No records were threatened. George Stulac of Toronto won the eight-pound shot put with a heave of 35 feet, 4½ inches and also won the pole vault with a leap of 11 feet, nine inches.

Wendy Kellond of Vancouver won the shot put with a toss of 36 feet, three inches.

Wendy Barlett of St. James, Man., won the women's broad jump with a mark of 16 feet, 1½ inches. Winnipeg's Dave Drybrough posted 1:57.6 for the 800-yard run. Henry Gyle of Edmonton won the three-mile run by 440 yards.

A Maritime team won the mile relay contest. Allison McNichol of New Brunswick led off, followed by Peter Watson, Jim Corbett and Mike Noble, all of Nova Scotia.

Argo Comeback Sinks Alouettes

TORONTO (CP)—Toronto Argonauts, fighting back to score two quick converted touchdowns on two sensational plays in a spine-tling fourth quarter, edged Montreal Alouettes 15-14 Friday night in their home opener of the Big Four football season.

The Argos, down 14-1 going into the final quarter, produced the touchdowns within two minutes of each other to send the crowd of 19,492 wild.

The first was scored by the brilliant Dave Mann on a 130 yard runback of an attempted field goal and the second went to tackle Dick Fouts off a blocked kick.

Argos had been completely out-gassed by the injury-riddled Alouettes until then. The Toronto

club, outplayed along the line and showing little offensive punch, came to life as the breaks turned their way in the final 15 minutes.

The win, their first of the season, came on top of their 44-7 defeated by Ottawa Rough Riders in their opening game of the season Tuesday night. Alouettes, beaten previously by the Grey Cup champion Hamilton Tiger-Cats 27-14, fell into the cellar with Friday night's loss.

Joel Wells, hard-running half-back from Clemons College, scored both Montreal touchdowns and Billy Bewley converted both.

Vic Kristopaitis, besides converting the Toronto touchdowns scored by Mann and Fouts, kicked a single in the second quarter on a wide field goal attempt.

UP TWO STROKES

Herbert Shoots Into Golf Lead

EDMONTON (CP) — Jay Hebert, 35-year-old easy-going Frenchman from Sanford, Fla., galloped into a two-stroke lead at the end of 54 holes in the Canadian open golf championship Friday. His five-under-par 65 gave him a 199-total and a two-stroke margin over the par-mashing field.

The sun-bronzed native of Martinsville, La., started two shots behind co-leaders Doug Sanders of Miami Beach, Fla., and Bob Goetz of Tulsa, Okla., who were shunted out of their lofty perch. Sanders ballooned to a one-over-par 71 after 67-75 rounds and Goetz returned with a one-under-par 69 after 67-65 rounds.

HECTIC ROUND
After a hectic, course-wrecking round during which 32 of the 99 starters got under the par-70 figure over the posh Mayfair course layout, Hebert ended with his two-stroke margin over Tom Jacobs of Whittier, Calif.

Jacobs fired a 68 following 66-67 rounds for a 201-total. He was tied in second place when Goetz and Wes Ellis, Jr., of Ridgewood, N.J., who blazed a five-under-par 65 to go with his 67-69 rounds.

Another stroke behind were Vancouver's Stan Leonard and Al

Balding of Toronto. Leonard, at 44 one of the oldest pros on the tournament trail, finished with 69 and Balding, long-legged pro from Toronto, returned a two-under-par 68.

Another four were tied at 201, which would make Saturday's final 18 of the 72-hole \$25,000 tournament one of the most tense in its 49-year history.

Bracketed four strokes behind Hebert were Arnold Palmer of Latrobe, Pa., 1955 Canadian open winner who hit an even-par 70; Sanders, who won the title as an amateur in 1956; Mike Souchak of Grossinger, N.Y., and Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla. Souchak toured the course in 69 and Finsterwald in 68 Friday.

The field kicked par figures around indiscriminately.

The course record of 64, set by Leonard seven years ago, was tied twice. Doug Ford, 33-year-old pro from Paradise, Fla., has won more than \$150,000 in the big time since 1953, and George Bayer of Lemont, Ill., came in early with six-under-par figures.

But their big round may have come too late to give either a good shot at the first-place \$3,000 prize money when the tournament ends today. The six-foot-five-inch Bayer, at 204, was five strokes behind Hebert and Ford was another four strokes in arrears.

Gil Turner Triumphs

NEW YORK (AP) — Welterweight contender Gil Turner of Philadelphia used his weight and a steady body attack Friday night to rack up a unanimous 10-round decision over Stefan Redl of Passaic, N.J., at Madison Square Garden. Turner weighed 151¼ to Redl's 147.

Turner, a 6-to-5 underdog in a late switch of odds, received the verdict from the three officials.

Referee Teddy Martin scored it 6-3-1, judge Harold Barnes 7-3 and judge Mike Davidowitch 6-4.
