### ADOPT REFORM MOTION

In a plenary meeting of the national council earlier Tuesday, delegates adopted an electoral reform resolution sponsored by J. W. Pickersgill, MP for Newfoundland's Bonaville-Twillingate, which would lower the voting age to 18 from 21 and provide for payment of major election campaign expenses out of the federal treasury.
