Prince County Hospital Reports Active Year

SUMMERSIDE — Prince County Hospital here reported one of the busiest years on record in 1958 with 3,328 patients having been admitted to hospital. The highest occupancy for any day was reached Nov. 14th when 102 adults and children, and 11 new born babies occupied beds in the hospital. During the year 712 births were recorded. X-ray procedures numbered 4,739, surgical procedures 15,036 and laboratory procedures 21,484.
