Large Attendance At Eucharistic Congress

The ninth Eucharistic Congress of the Diocese of Charlottetown was held yesterday at the Parish of St. Simon and St. Jude, Tignish, where pastor, Rev. Michael J. Rooney, and the parishioners of Tignish were hosts to visiting Bishops, Priests, Monsignors, members of religious orders and several thousand lay visitors from all parts of the Diocese.

On the grounds adjoining the church an outside altar was erected for the occasion.

The program for the day began at 7:00 A.M. when the children's mass was offered in the church by Most Rev. C.L. Nelligan, Assumption University, Windsor.

At 10:00 A.M. Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated at the altar on the Eucharistic grounds by Most Reverend M.A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown, assisted by Rt. Rev. Patrick McMahon, Dean of the Mass was Rev. Clarence Pitt; sub deacon, Rev. Richard Ellsworth, deacons of Honor, Rev. Justin MacDonald, Rev. Francis Corcoran.

Very Reverend P.T. MacDonald

and Rev. Eric Robin were the masters of ceremonies.

The sermon was delivered by Rt. Rev. G.J. MacLellan, V.G. who was a former parish priest in Tignish.

Monsignor MacLellan delivered an inspiring sermon on the significance of the Holy Eucharist, and its institution.

"One hundred years ago," he said "your ancestors erected this temple to the honor and glory of God and the multitude present here today bears witness that you have kept the trust and you will pass on this trust, this gift of faith to the generations to come."

The choir of St. Simon and St. Jude church was under the direction of Rev. Sylvester Gallant.

At 12:30, following Mass, dinner for the clergy was served in the Delton School.

The ceremonies were resumed at 2:00 P.M. with the children's holy hour inside the church, when Solemn Pontifical Benediction was offered by Most Rev. G.L. Landry, titular Bishop of Gnosburg, Rev. Edmund Roche preached an impressive sermon suitable to the occasion.

Deacon for the Benediction was Rev. Pius Murnaghan, sub deacon Rev. Nazaire Gallant and the deacon of exposition, Rev. Phelan McKenna.

At 4:00 P.M. Solemn Pontifical Mass was again celebrated inside the church the celebrant of the 4:00 o'clock Mass was most Rev. G.J. Berry, Archbishop of Halifax, assisted by Rt. Rev. J.A. Murphy, Dean of the Mass was Rev. William Simpson, Sub Deacon, Rev. Thomas MacLellan, deacons of honor, Very Rev. J.P.E. O'Hanley, Rev. J.W. McCordle master of ceremonies, Very Rev. P.F. MacDonald, Rev. Eric MacDonnell, Cross Bearer Rev. Wendell MacIntyre. The Most Reverend C.L. Nelligan delivered the sermon.

As the Mass concluded the Blessed Sacrament was carried from the church to the outside altar on the Congress grounds. The procession around the grounds was formed by the various Bishops who were present, the Monsignors, Priests, Sisters, the Members of the different societies, including the Holy Name Society, Children of Mary and hundreds of the faithful from every part of the diocese.

The Pontifical Benediction was given by Most Rev. J.R. MacDonald, Bishop of Antigonish.

During the ceremonies of the day members of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus, Bishop MacEachern Assembly, formed an honor guard for the church dignitaries present.

Serious Cases At Summerside

Mr. Hinton expressed regret that the public had to wait in court sometimes two or three hours to enter a plea of guilty in highway traffic cases. The magistrate said he had asked for assistance from the Attorney General's Department in this matter but none was forthcoming. He stated the criminal cases have priority and because of this the highway traffic cases are not receiving disposition.

Kensington By-Election Is Called After Resignation

The Kensington Town Council met on Monday evening with Mayor Everett Champion and five councillors present. Bills amounting to \$381.88 were ordered paid. Policeman Livingstone reported fines amounting to \$128 had been paid. Receipt of \$20 for hall rent was also acknowledged. After discussion on the fire assistance fund it was agreed that owing to the fact that the Mutual Insurance Co. is paying the policy holder instead of the town a \$25 fee, it will be necessary from now on to charge the property owner the full amount of the \$50 fee.

RESIGNATION

A letter from Councillor Bruce Roberts was read tendering his resignation which was accepted.

July 22 was selected as Nomination Day to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Councillor Roberts. Councillor W. MacLean gave notice that he will introduce a by-law respecting poll tax and personal assessment on real and personal property and licence rate in the Town of Kensington.

In regard to inquiries of financing a new fire truck, Mayor Champion had reported that he received notice from J.J. MacKay that the company had been advised, "to hold up all projects including financing of trucks until such time as they were able to work a new finance set-up."

Discussion on fire assistance scheme resulted in a motion by Councillor Robert Carruthers, seconded by Councillor Bruce MacLeod and carried that anyone wishing to become a member of the fire assistance scheme within a radius of approximately ten miles may subscribe by making a payment of \$3 to the Kensington Town Clerk. All subscriptions will expire by end of December.

A request from the B.A. Oil Co. for a building permit to be granted providing certain requirements are filled by the company. The meeting adjourned to reconvene on Friday evening for further business.

Alberta Is Checking On Non-Licensed Meat Pedlars

Mayor Herbert Matthews presided and all councillors were present for the regular meeting of the Alberton Town Council Monday night. Following the approval of bills amounting to \$654.53 a letter was read from a local meat market operator regarding meat pedlars operating in the town without purchasing a licence. Councillors Perley and John Profit were appointed to investigate and report to the town clerk.

Reporting for the finance committee Councillor Campbell said that as town finances were very low immediate steps are to be taken to collect all back taxes.

Mayor Matthews stated that thousands of bushels of potatoes have been piled in the town dump and numerous complaints were being received from residents near the area. Following discussion, it was agreed that the practice of dumping potatoes in the town dumping area would have to be stopped unless arrangements were made to have them covered over.

The police report, read by town policeman MacDonald, showed

five convictions under the Highway Traffic Act, one drunk, one obstruction and an impaired driving charge pending.

Misses Wesley Hardy and Angus Milligan have been appointed Town assessors and the work is partly completed.

Following a long discussion on town policing problems the meeting adjourned.
