An Eye Opener.

The Patriot has been awakened to the fact that "Montreal is becoming a very rich city." The fact is the more wonderful to our contemporary, because it is co-existent with the N. P. "How can it be?" Montreal ought, on Grit principles, to be getting poorer.

This ought to be "a pleasing state of affairs." To a true Patriot it would be a matter for sincere congratulation; for the prosperity of the towns depends upon the prosperity of the country; and the fact that the towns are prosperous shows that the country at large is prosperous also.

The Patriot says that the foreign trade of Canada has increased 15 per cent. in ten years, while that of Montreal has increased 49 per cent.;

But it is held that because Montreal does not purchase as much from us as we buy from her, we are under a disadvantage on account of the obliteration of the Customs line which formerly prevented our merchants from dealing with hers!

That the Upper Provinces do not buy more of the produce of the Maritime Provinces is greatly to be regretted; but we have no doubt that as Montreal and the other great cities become rich, and the means of traffic with them are improved, they will be large purchasers of the produce of our fisheries, our mines and our fields.

The Public Debt.

The remarks of the Minister of Justice concerning the public debt of Canada are well worth reading. It is true that the burden of the public debt is now heavier, by about half a cent per head, than it was in 1878.

The Fisheries.

REPORTS SHOWING THEIR PRESENT SUCCESS AND THEIR PROMISE.

The following is reported by the American Fish Bureau for Sept. 16 and 17:—Arrivals the past 24 hours, five from the Georges banks and five from Western banks, with a total of 335,000 pounds of cod.

The total receipts at Gloucester for the week ending Sept. 16, 1886, is 59 faves, with 1,239,000 pounds cod, 313,260 pounds halibut, 7,000 pounds cusk, 32,000 pounds haddock, 14,000 pounds hake, 1,476 barrels mackerel.

Portland.—Four arrivals from North Bay, with a total of 850 barrels mackerel and one empty; two from the shore with 75 barrels mackerel.

Provincetown.—Four arrivals from North Bay, with a total of 511 barrels mackerel; one from Grand Banks, 2,600 quintals cod; two from whaling, 30 barrels sperm oil.

Harwichport.—Arrived from North Bay, schooner Charlotte Brown, with 270 barrels mackerel.

Souris, P. E. I.—No catch of mackerel by boats or seines. A large fleet of seiners are here in port; they are discouraged and will soon leave.

Latest from other ports: Portland.—Five arrivals from eastern shore with a total of 305 barrels mackerel.

Wellfleet—Arrivals from North Bay, schooner Mary E. Wharf, with 180 barrels.

Provincetown.—Schooner Grace Littleton arrived from Grand Banks with 4,000 quintals codfish. Schooner Quickstep, from whaling, with 55 barrels sperm oil.

Monhegan.—Weather rough, no seiners about; netters and hookers take some large mackerel; small mackerel plenty; no herring reported here; plenty of Matinicus; also schools of large mackerel seen off there, only in the night.

New London, P. E. I.—No mackerel seen schooling for some time. It is the opinion that all large sized mackerel have left.

North Bay—Small mackerel plenty about here.

Boston—One arrival from North Bay with 150 barrels mackerel. High prices are bringing forward all stock of old and new mackerel that have accumulated at the principal ports.

St. John's, N. F.—Exports of codfish from this port from August 1 to 28, 1885, 24,164; 1886, 49,174 quintals.

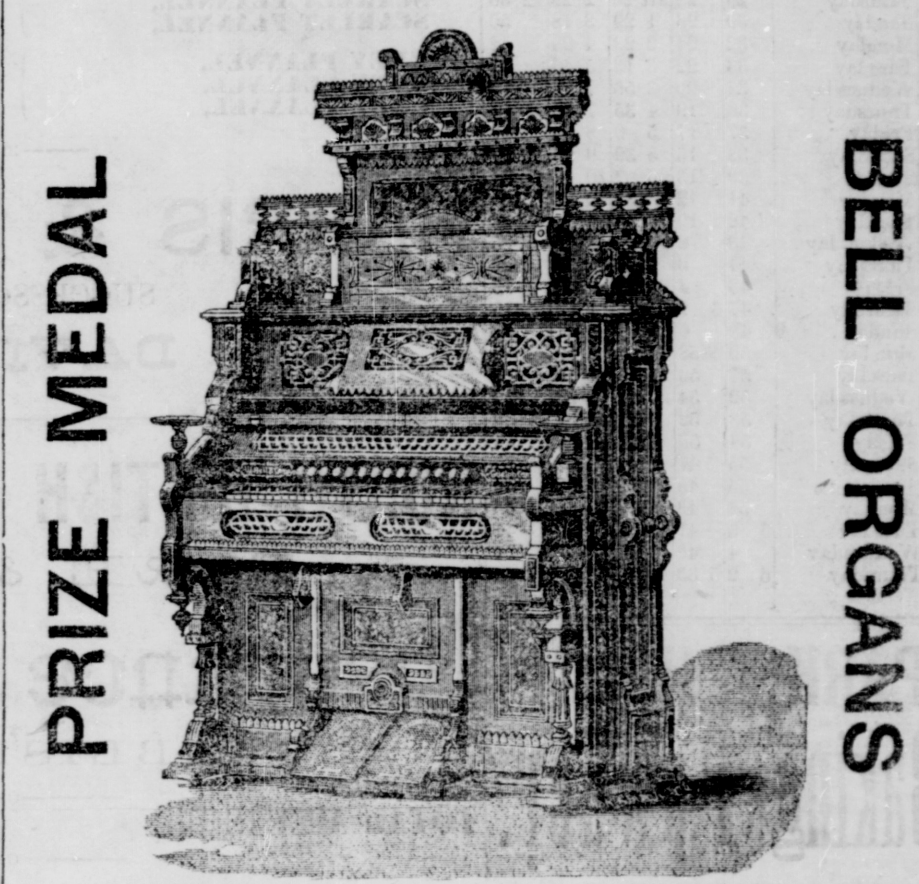
