Scotch Hal who fooled all the experts last week in winning a dash of the feature, and last but not least the rear pacer mare Rose Robin who has paced the fastest mile this year at the local track. Any of these speedsters is capable of walking off with top honors and picking a winner in this class will certainly be a tough chore.

Seven more speedsters go in dashes 4 and 8. John "Buddy" Campbell will lead Amos Frost away on the rail, Claude O'Brien's Lucky V. who paced to a new lifetime mark his last time out will leave from two, the fast-breaking Splurge will leave from the three spot, Ralph MacFadden's great pacer Elmer G will leave from four, Stanley Mayhew's fine pacer mare Glamorous Wick who has a trip 1:20.8 and a piece one month ago will leave from the five spot, Dr. Preston McIntyre's Countess Alice will leave from the outside, and the Don MacNeill driven Whirl will trail out Amos Frost.

## HUNTERS' CORNER

# Odd Brood Of Ducks Are Reported Spotted

As I type this "Corner" July 21 on the verge of mid-month and the odd brood of black ducks have been spotted. By mid-August a fair estimate can be made with regard to the current hatch with respect to this province. The skunk is the top predator with respect to next robbing. In years past black ducks favoured thorn hedges as nesting sites, as the crow was the main predator our ducks had to contend with. They found out with the advent of skunks, that thorn hedges offered but slight deterrent to this imported predator, they simply tunneled under the thorn growth and feasted to their hearts content. Our present day black ducks favour four fields, and well center at that.

This current having season is earlier than ordinary due to early spring conditions and a number of nests have been destroyed by hay mowers. About three weeks ago Willard Stewart, Waterside, a dedicated fox hunter and predator control enthusiast, was busy cutting hay and ran over a black nest in a field. Three of the eleven eggs were broken and signs indicated that the duck had been sitting about two weeks. The farmer or hay cutter, would have changed the incubation period—unavoidable. Willard took a different view. He shut off the tractor and placed the still hot in his cap and high tailed it for his car parked nearby and drove straight to Lorne Jenkins home at MacKenzie's Corner. On a twenty-one chance he might have a broody hen available and he had a broody bantam just dying for some eggs to hatch in two weeks seven sweet little black ducks were perfectly at home under their foster mother. The 8th managed to peek one small hatchling—she shell but failed to break out. A few evenings ago I called and had a look at them and they were contented as if she had been their real mother. When they are old enough to fend for themselves, Lorne has a private spruce bordered, flag studded dam, where no shooting is allowed, in mind in which to give them their freedom. Not many farmers, in the midst of haying, would have taken time out for such a kindly act. It's too bad that we haven't a few more like Willard in this age when the motto appears to be: "It's alive, kill it!"

It is this columnist's opinion, regardless of what our biologist clan may contend, that within a two year period from the present date, our government will be forced to adopt drastic control measures with regard to our skunk problem. Our "sooth sayers" in the biological realm sure placed themselves out on a limb with their skunk theory of "letting nature take its course". Nature did not include the skunk in her scheme of things with respect to this fair Garden Province of ours. Odoriferous could easily replace the "fair" emotion of such an event a bounty could be demanded on more than James' skunk. There is no point in hiding ones head in the sand—we do have a skunk problem on our hands ... and HOW.

# Harry Jerome To Compete Dempsey Expresses Opinion

VANCOUVER (CP)—Harry Jerome, co-holder of the world record in the 100 yard and 100 metre dashes, will compete in the British Empire Games Aug. 4-14 in Kingston, Jamaica.

Jerome was reported today as having cleaned up a schedule conflict involving a summer tour of the University of British Columbia and will be in Vancouver for the Games.

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—There is no question in Jack Dempsey's mind—the fight game is dead.

"There is no fight game today," the former champion said. "There never will be again."

Dempsey stopped here on his way for a big celebration at his birthplace, Manassa, a tiny community in Colorado's San Luis Valley, this weekend. Manassa Mauler was one of his fight labels in the 1920s.

He will dedicate Jack Dempsey Park, the chief feature of which is a small log cabin in which he was born 71 years ago.

Little Art a rangy seven year old bay trotting gelding owned by George Sempie of Kensington and driven by Alyn Pineau captured both ends of the featured Invitational trot and pace at the Charlottetown Driving Park last night. The big son of Dean Gallon, dam Marion L. trotted to a win in the fifth dash in 2:07.2 and came back to capture the repeat in the sizzling time of 2:07.1. The 2:07.1 mile in race time was only one-fifth of a second off the Charlottetown Driving Park trotting record of 2:07 set by Bill Hoggles Stormy Song in 1962.

Little Art a big favorite at the city track went to top both times and led from wire to wire in picking up the winners share of the purse. Amy Thorpe driven by Buddy Campbell, who drove Stormy Song to the track record in 1962, was 3-2, and another trotter Topway owned and driven by Wilbur McArthur was 2-3.

Bell's Last driven by owner Randall MacDonald captured the night's curtain raiser in the time of 2:15.2. Clegway driven by Allie Carr was second, and Barbara's Tag driven by Bobby Craig was third.

Bold Debby owned by E.W. Ross of Flat River and driven by Emmett Bernard was the other double dash winner on the card. The eight year old chestnut mare won the second dash in 2:13.3 and the sixth dash in 2:15.3.

Susan's Birthday driven by Wilbur McArthur trotted home in front in the third dash in the time of 2:12.4 equalling her lifetime mark. Starlight, Pride finished second and Harless' Abb third.

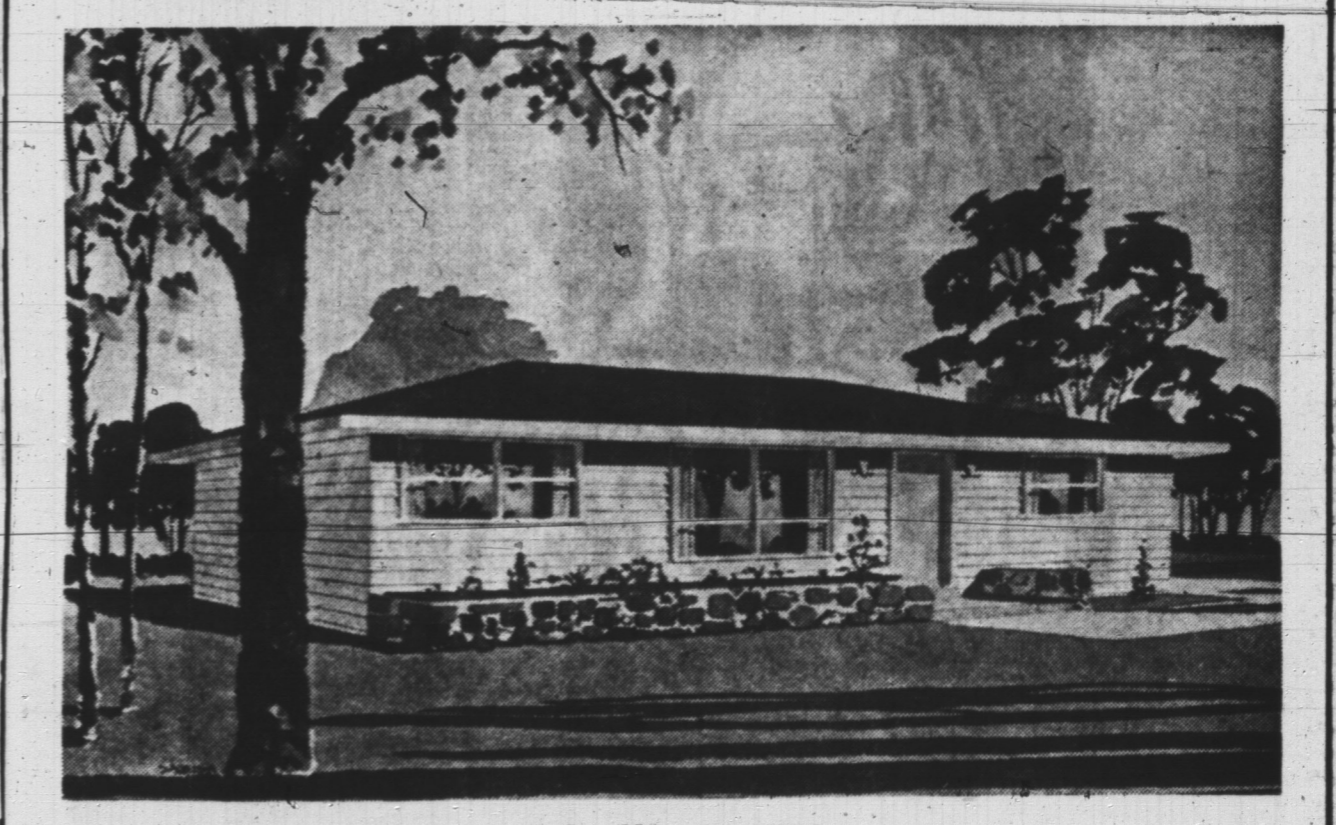
