Local and Other Items.

SHIPPED FROM SUMMERSIDE.—The Journal reports that Mr S H Jones shipped 1260 lambs from Summerside to Boston on Monday and Tuesday, and a buver from Haverhill Mass., shipped 440 to that place on the following morning.

OYSTER FISHING.—Oystershipments continue very small, owing to the continued high winds, which prevent fishing in the Bays. The prospects are that the exports this season will be the smallest for some years past.—Journal.

AN INTERESTING PAIR.—A Rockland, Me, couple recently filed marriage intentions at the clerk's office, which were of more than ordinary interest. The prospective groom was 24 years old and this will be his second marriage. The bride-elect is only 21, but this will be her third attempt to obtain connubial bliss.

SOCIAL.—The Baptist Social last night was a distinct success from every point of view. The musical programme included two choruses by the choir, vocal solos by Messrs E. H. Mitchell and Chas Earle and the Misses Earle, Yeo and Butler and instrumental selections by Misses McPherson and Fernhill, and Mr. Warren. Mr. J. P. Gordon made an excellent chairman.

AFTER THE FIFTH WIFE.—A man who resides in the rural district near Truro, N. S., and who a few weeks ago followed his fourth wife to the grave, was in the neighboring district the other day looking for the fifth. A gentleman whom he met informed him of the whereabouts of several widows all eligible for marriage. He said he would visit them all and select one of them before returning home, and he had to be home to milk five cows at 7 o'clock in the evening of that day he was not going to be long in making the selection.—Headlight.

AUSTRALIAN FREIGHT RATES.—A report recently issued by the Commissioner of Railways in New South Wales, where all the lines are operated by the Government, shows a total of 2,690 miles with gross earnings of \$15,133,740, and net earnings of \$7,060,715. The freight traffic aggregate 14,561,943 tons and the average rate is 2.76 cents per ton per mile. The average rate in Canada and the United States is considerably less than one cent per ton per mile. Indeed the through rates on the I C R are less than half a cent.

FOOTBALL.—Mr B C Prowse, of Charlottetown, was an eye-witness of the football match at Montreal on Saturday, to which reference was made in yesterday's paper. He describes the game as lively throughout, both McGill and Montreal fighting hard for supremacy. In the course of a lengthy report of the game the Montreal Herald has the following to say regarding Gordon Alley, of Charlottetown, who captained the McGill team: "Alley never played better football than he is putting up this year. It was his first appearance as captain, and he handles his men splendidly. There are few who have a better idea of the fine points of the game than he." To this it may be added that Mr. Alley is very popular with his fellow students as well as with the teaching staff of Old McGill.

Mr. Hardacre—Oh, yes. About nine times out of ten there's a divorce in it.—Exchange.

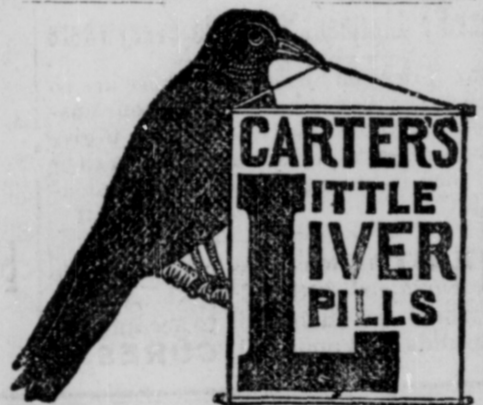
His Mind Still Clear.
