THE NEWS OF THE DAY.

The Chinese are leaving Texas and going west.
Counterfeit coin to the amount of £500,000 has been put in circulation in Egypt.
Cincinnati has commenced putting down \$400,000 worth of granite blocks on her streets.
A clerk belonging to a well known commercial house in Valparaiso has absconded with \$80,000.
A Silesian peasant woman has been arrested on a charge of having poisoned four husbands.
The Queen intends to witness Faust and the performances of Minnie Palmer and Mrs. Langtry.
A woman in Wing's Station, N. Y., has given birth to twenty-five children, and she is not fifty years old.
Mme. Heilbron, prima donna, is dead. She leaves a daughter 13 years old, and a fortune of £120,000.
Forrest, a reformed gambler and drunkard, is running a highly exciting revival meeting in Missouri.
The doctors of Tunkhannock, Pa., have excited popular indignation by blacklisting delinquent customers.
The yearly exports of umbrellas from England are valued at £581,000. A good item for a rainy day.
One firm in Western Massachusetts last year made 130,000 drums. They have a great deal to answer for.
A Brooklyn girl is developing a healthy beard around her rosy mouth. She will not tell who she caught it from.
Stonewall Jackson's old charger died on Monday at the age of 32. The skin will be stuffed and the skeleton mounted.
The Mayor of Milwaukee has signed the eight-hour ordinance, making eight hours a full day for all employes of the city.
The see of Quebec, whose archbishop, Taschereau, will be made a cardinal on April 12, was erected in October, 1674.

There are in twenty-two States of the Union 308,478 more women than men. Dakota has 29,415 more men than women.
The ill-feeling between the French and Germans is assuming a serious turn. The German press is becoming especially rancorous.
The police commissioner at Ludwigs-shafen, Germany, has been jailed for embezzling money collected from dog licenses.
A young gentleman of seven gave directions to his hair cutter to cut his hair "like papa's please, with a little round hole at the top."
It is a strange thing that the man who knows exactly how to run a newspaper is always engaged in some other kind of business.
The negroes are nothing if they are not consistent. Most of the colored girls in the southern schools are either called Lily or Blanche.
Archer and Wood, the two noted English jockeys, according to the income tax assessment, made last year respectively \$50,000 and \$45,000.
At Grand Anse, Gloucester County, N. B., an old man named Gustave Dumas, fell into a well forty feet deep and was instantly killed on Saturday.

A Pennsylvania prophet has predicted the end of the world three centuries hence. This is the most considerate prophecy of the kind that has yet been made.
While David Strong, of Medway, O., was eating his dinner one day last week, the upper set of his false teeth fell into his throat and he was choked to death.
Mrs. Lenders and her daughter, aged 12, were killed at a railway crossing at Berrington, N. Y., on the 20th. Their horses took fright and ran into the train.
Wm. Dingman, a farm laborer, living near St. Thomas, Ont., slipped and fell on an axe he was carrying. The elbow cap was severed, and the chances are that the arm will be useless for life.

It is stated that the Canadian Pacific Railway intend building a new steamship this year at Owen Sound to replace the wrecked Algoma, the latter's engines and boilers to be used in the new vessel.
Willie Bradford, 5 years old, strayed away from his home in the Cherokee Nation the other day, and the next day what the wolves had left of the poor little fellow was found in a mountain glen.
"Do you ever sweep under the bed?" enquired the head of the family of her young domestic while examining the spare room. "Oh, yes, often. It's so much easier than a dustpan, you know," replied the servant.
Leadville must be the prize fighters' paradise. At a contest between two heavy bruisers, in the fifty-third round the ring was broken into, but a dozen policemen with drawn revolvers restored order and the fight proceeded.
Two shoe factories and several dwellings at Newburyport, Mass., were destroyed by fire, Sunday morning. Loss about \$80,000; insurance, \$60,000. One hundred persons are thrown out of employment and several families made homeless.

James Palmer, a farmer of New Durham, N. H., reproved his 13-year old son on Friday afternoon, for some cause, after which the boy went out into the barn and hanged himself from a beam. His dead body was found an hour later.
In a late lecture at Yale, Prof. Arthur T. Hadley stated that no less than 15,000 per-

sons were injured annually in the United States from the single duty of coupling cars. The estimate is made from statistics of surgical aid given to such cases.

Miss Daisy Carroll, one of the best known ladies of Rhea County, Tennessee, has been arrested for complicity in the embezzlement of about \$100,000 from the Champion works of Springfield, Ohio, by the confidential book-keeper, Frank Jones.

Joseph Egan, laborer, while engaged in rolling stone boulders down an incline on the Church street dock, Toronto, a few days ago, fell in front of a moving stone, which went over both his feet, crushing them so badly that amputation will likely be necessary.

The Berlin Post says France confesses that she is willing to attack Germany. This is serious. Germany, who desired to conciliate France, will now recognize the uselessness of conciliation and will wish that Frenchmen will soon find the opportunity they desire.

S. B. Walrous, one of the wealthiest merchants and stock raisers in New Mexico, committed suicide by shooting. His son committed suicide a few months ago. The father's suicide was committed on the same spot and with the same pistol that ended the son's life.

A cyclone passed through the northern part of Indiana on the night of the 22nd, visiting the village of Williamsport with the greatest effect. Two churches were destroyed, many dwellings damaged and every barn in the village overturned. A number of cattle were killed.

A son of James Edwards, of Westminster County, Middlesex, Ont., was seized after supper a few days ago with vomiting and pain in the stomach, and died in a few hours. Two of his sisters and his father are dangerously ill. The accidental eating of diseased pork is assigned as the cause.

The loss of the Oregon is but a repetition of the old story of ocean steamship disasters. The sea rolled into one compartment. The others were water-tight, but the bulkheads between them had been opened to admit of the readier passage of luggage, and one after another they filled. The Oregon was doomed.

Newspapers in eastern Prussia assert that the Emperor of Russia has signed a decree expelling non-naturalized Germans from Poland. Laborers without contracts must leave within three days, and those having contracts within a month. Mechanics are given three months, hand-workers six months and manufacturers nine months within which to leave the country.

A shocking disaster occurred lately at Aulnay de Saintonge, in the Charante Inferieure. A fair was being held, and upwards of 2000 oxen were drawn up in a field, when a band of ruffians exciting the animals, they rushed furiously among the crowd. Three persons were killed outright, 40 very seriously injured, while 100 more were badly bruised. In the meanwhile the miscreants who had wrought this mischief decamped with nearly £800 which they had purloined.

Two very sudden deaths occurred in Montreal last week under singular circumstances. Mrs. Louis Ouimet, who had attended confession with Rev. Mr. Marsolais, on Monday, suddenly fell dead on Thursday evening while kneeling before the altar in Notre Dame Cathedral. Rev. Mr. Marsolais died suddenly on the Tuesday preceding. Mrs. Ouimet was mother of Mr. Alphonse Ouimet, advocate, one of the commissioners appointed to settle the claims of the half breeds.

Peter Wagner, a farmer, arrived at Du-buque, Minn., on Friday, with a wagon load of pork, and while trying to dispose of it two girls, six and eight years old, were discovered lying in a pitiable condition between the hogs. On examination it was found that they were almost lifeless. Wagner was asked what he was doing with the children, and replied that he could do nothing for them until he had disposed of the hogs, and added, "I have had them long enough." The children were taken out from their fearful surroundings, but died soon after. Wagner admitted that they had had nothing to eat for a long time, and had no sleep the previous night, having ridden all the time with the dead hogs.

Another monopoly bids fair to be broken for many years gods have been manufactured by the English. The monopoly of the business has made the god makers careless, and they have been furnishing an inferior line of goods of late. The Hindoo claim that the paint is bad, the wood cross-grained and knotty, and the countenance entirely too ugly to be worshipped with any degree of comfort. Some enterprising Canadian will step in presently, and make gods of such excellence and beauty that they will knock the hideous English deities clear out of the market.

INGERSOLL ON INTemperance—"I believe, gentlemen, that alcohol, to a certain degree, demoralizes those who make it, and those who drink it. I believe that, from the time it issues from the coiled and poisoned worm of the distillery, till it empties into the hell of crime, dishonor and death, it demoralizes all that touches it from its source to its end. All we have to do, gentlemen, is to think of the wretch upon either bank of the river of death—of the suicide—of the insanity—of the poverty—of the ignorance—of the destitution—of the children tugging at the faded dresses of weeping and despairing women crying for bread—of the men of genius it has wrecked—of the millions struggling with imaginary serpents produced by this devilish thing; and when you think of the jails, of the almshouses, of the asylums, of the prisons, and of the scaffolds upon either bank, I do not wonder that every thoughtful man is prejudiced against that damned stuff called alcohol."
