

Public Meeting at West Point.

A large and influential meeting of the inhabitants of West Point was held at the house of Mr. John Stewart, on Wednesday, the 4th day of December, at 3 o'clock, p.m., for the purpose of taking into consideration matters relating to the Wharf at that place.

A Committee consisting of five was appointed to carry out the foregoing resolution, viz: Arthur Ramsay, D. C. Ramsay, and James McLellan, Esq., and Messrs. John Crawford and John Auld.

It was then moved and carried that a report of this meeting be prepared and forwarded to the Summerside papers for publication, after which the meeting broke up.

By letters received by last mail from Messrs. William and Clement White of this city, we understand that produce is in good demand in St. John's Newfoundland.

Dawson's Cottage on the Brighton Road was sold at auction yesterday by William Dodd, Esq., for £1025. Purchaser Mr. Benjamin Heartz, of the firm of Heartz & Son.

The subject of debate on last Monday evening—Should Education be made compulsory by the State—was opened by D. Leman, Esq.

The latest telegrams show that the Fenians are determined to give the British Government some trouble. The London dates of the 18th says:—

Powder was placed under one wall of Millbank Jail in which a number of Fenians are confined. Preparations were all completed, and fuse lighted without attracting attention; fortunately on account of some defect in arrangement of materials, powder did not explode.
