**Household Hints.**

**Fruit Stains.**—To remove fruit stains, let the spotted part of the cloth imbibe a little water without dipping it, and hold the part over two or three lighted brimstone matches at a proper distance. The sulphurous gas which is discharged soon causes the spots to disappear.

**Old Chairs.**—To restore the elasticity of cane chair bottoms, turn the chair bottom upward, and with hot water and a sponge wash the cane; work it in well, so that it will be well soaked; let it dry in the air, and it will be as tight and firm as new, provided none of the canes are broken.

**To Clean Marble.**—Soap in any shape must never touch marble, for it turns it permanently yellow. To clean it, mix pumice stone and very clear water to the thickness of cream, and rub it all over with a soft brush, just as a man lathers his face for shaving; lather it well. Let this dry on, and then brush off with a stiff hair brush—not a whisk. These brushes must not be too stiff, and must be perfectly clean.

**Vinegar.**—Save the parings and cores of apples; put them in a jar with warm water enough to more than cover them; set them in a warm place for several days, then strain and add one pint of molasses to a gallon of the water; put in a jar, tie a thin cloth over it, keep in a warm place, and in two weeks you will have good vinegar.

**To Clean Steel Engravings.**—Place the engraving in a shallow dish or tray; cover to the depth of one-half inch with a weak solution of chloride of lime (about a teaspoonful to a pint of spring water) for about six hours; pour off carefully without touching the paper, and dry in the sun; afterward remove the deposit carefully with a camel's hair brush from the face of the picture.

**To Clean Silver.**—Table silver should be cleaned at least once or twice a week, and can easily be kept in good order and polished brightly in this way: Have your dish can half full of boiling water; place the silver in, so that it may get warm; then with a soft cloth dipped into the hot water, soaped, and sprinkled with powdered borax, scour the silver well; then rinse in clean, hot water; dry with a clean, dry cloth.

**HANGING PREFERRED TO IMPRISONMENT.**

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 28.—One of the most singular cases in the annals of criminal law was decided to-day by Judge Bingham in the Common Pleas Court. Some years ago Mrs. Sarah M. Victor was convicted in the courts of Cuyahoga County of murder in the first degree, having poisoned her brother, and was sentenced to be hanged. The sentence was commuted by the Governor to imprisonment for life. Since that time Mrs. Victor has been confined in the Ohio penitentiary. The prisoner grew tired of life under such circumstances, and spent the hours, many of them in solitary confinement, in constant weeping. In January, 1876, she made application to the courts in this city to have the original sentence carried out, on the ground that she had not consented to the commutation. The case was without parallel in history, and presented itself to the court in the shape of a very knotty problem. Judge Bingham, after having the matter under advisement for eighteen months, rendered an opinion holding that Mrs. Victor is in law an escaped prisoner after conviction, and issued an order to the Sheriff for her delivery to the authorities of Cuyahoga County to await action by the court of said county. Attorney General Little, legal adviser of the Warden of the Penitentiary, subsequently made application to the Supreme Court for leave to file a petition in error, which was granted, and stay of execution of Judge Bingham's decisions ordered until the case can be finally heard. Mrs. Victor will accordingly remain in the Penitentiary. The opinion of high legal talent is to the effect that Judge Bingham's order will not be sustained by the Supreme Court. The case excites great interest here.

—Portage DuFort, on the 4th—A child of John Amy, of this place, aged two years, was attacked yesterday by a fierce rooster, and had not its shrieks brought its mother to the rescue, it would probably have been killed. As it was, its head and face were badly cut by the bird's beak and spurs.

—Bishop Conroy will remain in Canada for about a year. His headquarters will be at Quebec. He will probably stay a short time during this week with Bishop Ryan at Buffalo.

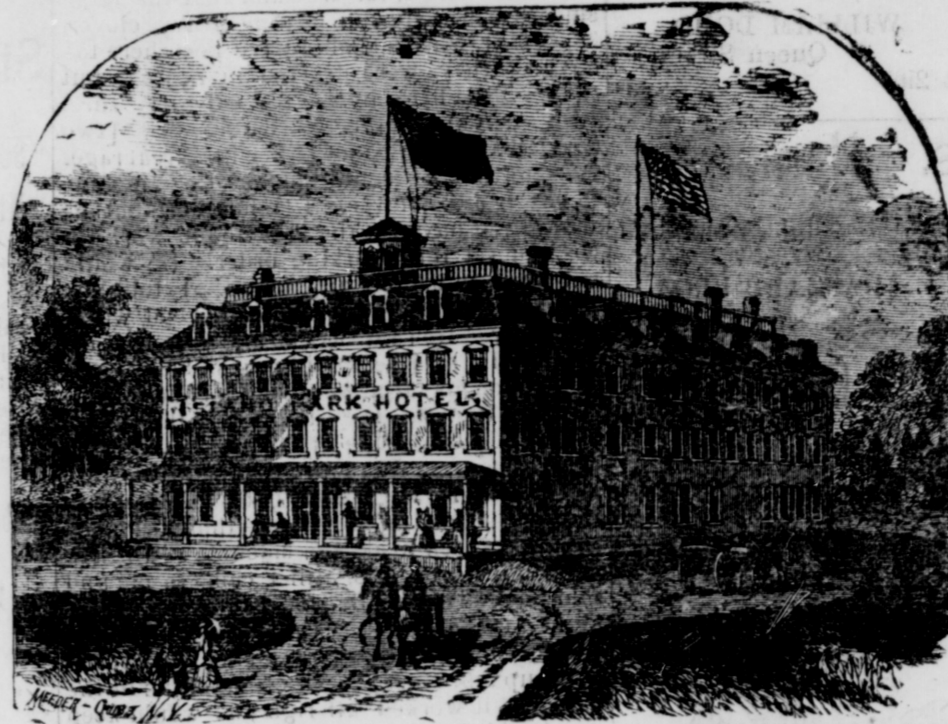
