N.S. Hog Marketing Record Seen

HALIFAX (CP) — Agriculture Minister I.W. Akerley said Monday a record number of hogs will be marketed in Nova Scotia this year, according to Dominion Bureau of Statistics figures for September.

Mr. Akerley said there were 61,000 hogs on Nova Scotia farms Sept. 1 last year, including 11,000 over six months of age and 50,000 under six months. Some 61,000 hogs were recorded under six months of age Sept. 1 this year and 12,000 six months of age or over. The figures represent a 20-per-cent increase.

He said the quality of hogs is fast improving and Nova Scotia hog producers are in the business to stay.

Royalty Man Is Recovering In Hospital

An East Royalty man, Frank Hughes, was rushed to the Charlottetown Hospital on Saturday after coming in contact with a high tension wire while making repairs to a power line near Orwell Head Church, Kinross.

The man was reported working near the top of a 30-foot pole when he received the shock of electricity throwing him to the ground.

He suffered severe electrical burns to his left hand and left leg. Dr. John Gillis was called to the scene and ordered the victim to hospital where he was attended by Dr. Frank MacMillan.

He was taken to hospital by ambulance at approximately 3 o'clock. His general condition is reported to be good, however, he is not expected to leave the hospital for some time yet.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says a weather system which had become nearly stationary over the Maritimes late Monday was causing showers, drizzle and intermittent rain in sections of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and southern New Brunswick.

Little movement is foreseen for the weather system over eastern North America before late Wednesday, and consequently little change from present weather conditions over the Maritimes is forecast.

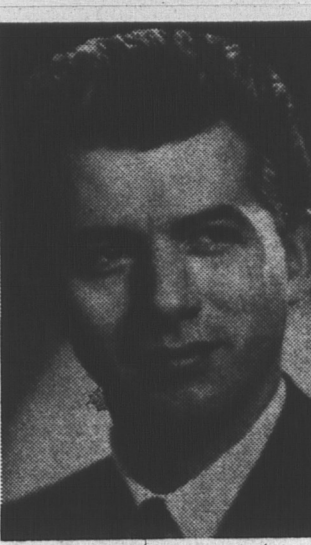

SDU Delegation Attends Meeting

A three-man delegation from St. Dunstan's University is in Ottawa this week to attend the annual meeting of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada being held at the Chateau Laurier.

Rt. Rev. G.A. Macdonald, president of SDU, left Sunday for the capital where he will be joined today by dean of studies Rev. V.G. Murnaghan, and Dr. Brendan O'Grady, head of the English department.

The week-long sessions got underway on Monday and will continue until Friday, October 28. Most Canadian universities are members of the AUCC.

Among the highlights will be commission reports on operational retrieval, pension study, cost study including formula financing, physical planning of campuses, and Latin-American collaboration.

Guest speaker at the annual banquet Wednesday evening will be Secretary of State Judy LaMarsh.

Other principal agenda items Thursday and Friday include plenary sessions on the Duff-Bersdahl Report on internal university-government, student-university relationships, and university-provincial government relationships.

Father Murnaghan will also attend a meeting of the association of deans of arts and science of Canadian Universities during his time in Ottawa.

The St. Dunstan's representatives are expected to return to Charlottetown over the weekend.

of fishing activities. Among them was a proposal a local committee should act as consultants to federal departments responsible for harbor facilities and that a study be made of fire protection for fishing harbors.

RISE COSTS The current Canadian furor over rising living costs sparked a resolution calling for an investigation into the spread of prices for fisheries products. It was also proposed the so-called Fishermen's Bounties be accumulated in order to set up a disaster fund, but this was referred back to the various fishermen's associations for further study.

Thanks were tendered the provincial government for its steps in education and engineering designed to prevent accidents, but it was suggested the government pay more attention to enforcement of the regulations.

TRAP LIMITS A three-pronged resolution dealt with trap limits and proposed an immediate survey of fishermen to determine their feelings on the inclusion of Nova Scotia and Cape Breton in District 7-B to learn their wishes regarding trap limits and licensing restrictions; that a prompt report be given on the experiment on trap restrictions in District 8; and the findings of both surveys be given to the industry.
