A Fine Schooner.

The Colonist of St. John's, Nfld. just to hand reports: "One of the finest fore-and-aft schooners seen here for a long time, lies at Messrs. J. & W. Pitts' wharf at present, where she is discharging a cargo of produce from Prince Edward Island. The schooner is called the Sunlight, and was built at Souris, Prince Edward Island, during the past year. She is ninety-nine tons register and is built of juniper and birch. She is eighty-three feet in length and twenty-three feet wide. The builder of the schooner is Captain Thomas Kiekham, member of the Provincial Parliament of Prince Edward Island for Souris. This is not the first schooner built, brought and sold here by Mr. Kiekham; he has already sold eleven schooners in St. John's, all first class models. The last five built had their names terminating in the word 'light'.

ADDRESS TO ARCHDEACON JONES.—The following is a copy of the address presented to Archdeacon Weston-Jones, to which reference was made yesterday:

The Ven. Archdeacon S. Weston Jones, Rector of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown.

We, the undersigned, members and parishioners of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, cannot allow you to vacate the rectoryship without expressing our deep regret at parting with you and Mrs. Jones.

White deeply deploring the causes that have led to your resigning the Rectoryship of St. Paul's, we recognize and desire to bear testimony to the value of your earnest ministrations and loyalty to the church, which have been productive of beneficial influence in drawing many nearer to Christ.

Your distinctive teaching of the doctrines of the church has awakened in a large portion of the congregation a sense of their duty to the Church, and we feel sure will bear fruit in due time, and make good churchmen of the rising generation.

Wishing yourself and Mrs. Jones every blessing in your new sphere of labor, we remain Your earnest well-wishers.

This address was signed by over a hundred of the parishioners of St. Paul's. The Archdeacon made a suitable reply.

PHILHARMONIC CONCERT.—Millet's "Angelus" is now being exhibited in Montreal and the Canadian people are thronging to see this wonderful masterpiece of one of the greatest artists whom Europe has produced, although, by the way, the French nation started him during the greater portion of his life. The people of Charlottetown will also have an opportunity on Thursday the twelfth of June, of becoming familiar with a masterpiece of one of the greatest of European musicians, when Haydn's "Creation" will be performed by the Philharmonic Society. The mere fact of this great work being produced we imagine will be sufficient to cause all music lovers in the city to attend the concert. The opportunity of hearing powerful classical music will probably be taken advantage of by all citizens who possess an ordinary amount of intelligence or refinement, and probably a large audience will gather to hear the celebrated oratorio. The success or failure in the rendering of the work altogether depends on the attendance at the next four practices. If the members come regularly and work steadily a splendid result (judging by some of the practices) may be anticipated.

The Model School.

The closing examination of the pupils of the Model School in connection with the Prince of Wales College and Normal School, was held this forenoon. There were not many visitors. Those who were in attendance must have been impressed by the dreary appearance of the building and yard. The building looks as though a coat of paint would do it good, and the yard

would certainly be the better of a few flowers, shrubs and trees—something to show that there is life and good taste about the place, and to serve as a model for the surroundings of schools which are not model schools. The Commissioner of Public Works must really give some attention to the exterior (if not to the interior) of the Model School building.

The pupils in attendance at the Model School number seventy-three. They are in two classes. The Advanced Department is under the supervision of Mr. McSwain, and the Primary Department under that of Miss Scott. The teachers are efficient and painstaking, and the scholars of the Advanced Class evidenced a familiar acquaintance with some of the most prominent features of their own country, while those of the latter seemed to be bright and intelligent.
