\$1,000,000 GONE!

A few days ago we submitted a statement showing that the net capital of the Province had been reduced by \$973,220.89 since the present Government obtained office. So great are the figures in proportion to the resources of this small community that we hoped the Patriot would have been able to show that a mistake had been made. But the Patriot only suggests the publication of the items making up the net capital at the end of 1890, and questions the propriety of capitalizing the grant of \$20,000 obtained by the exertions of the Liberal-Conservative Government. In reply to this we have only to say that the bases of the comparison are identical, as will be seen by reference to the public accounts. To convince our contemporary and the public that this is true in every particular, except the Land Office, we quote the figures from the accounts of the respective years:

Table with financial data for 1890, including balances due from purchasers of land, amount bearing interest at Ottawa, land purchase account, additional allowance of \$20,000 per annum, less floating debt, net capital at 31st December, 1890, and balances due from purchasers of lands, 31st December (estimated).

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

Tuesday, April 28.

After recess Mr. Shaw continued his opposition to the proposed amendment to the Schools Act. He thought the drying hours of the session was not an opportune time in which to bring up this bill. The present Government had not been friends of education. No better proof of this is needed than their failure to reappoint the third school inspector. He (Mr. Shaw) considered that he was the recipient of his extra pay did not rest his voice against this motion.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Peters the second reading of the bill was set down for to-morrow, with the understanding that the House will not prorogue before Friday.

Hon. Mr. Gordon then moved the following resolution: Resolved, That this House desires to place on record its deep dissatisfaction with the policy of deficits pursued by the present Government and its opinion that the failure to make revenue and expenditure meet is caused by a defective system of extravagance and waste in the public departments.

In moving this resolution Mr. Gordon stated that he did not do so for party purposes. Every individual who is in favor of our true condition. We want to stir up public opinion and see if some method cannot be devised to save the country from ruin. A few years ago under the governments of such men as Haveland, Cole, Whelan and our worthy Lieutenant Governor this country was ruled without indebtedness notwithstanding a very small revenue. Those governments gave to the public buildings which we enjoy today, public buildings worthy of the province. But the present Government has plunged us headlong into debt, and it is our united duty to do what we can to reduce that debt.

He did not expect to see the day when this debt would be entirely lifted. Years ago people from Nova Scotia and other parts of Canada complained that while we were comparatively free they were ground down with taxes. Today, in point of debt, we are as badly, if not worse, off than the other Provinces. Hence we must endeavor to wake up the members of this House, and the people represented by those members, to a realization of our indebtedness. If a man should be made by the banks, or if those who have contributed money under the Loans Act should make a demand, the credit of this Province would be gone and no resort would remain whereby to effect a remedy. We are, as it were, on the brink of a volcano, and instead of remaining in a position of comparative peace at once take steps to place this Province in a state of solvency. Years ago Byron sang of the beauties of the isles of Greece, which were then oppressed by a tyrannical government, and he devoted his life to the redemption of the people, but found that those beautiful islands were ruined by that government and irretrievably ruined—nothing being left them but their bright sunshine. So, if we do not wake up an engaged people insist on a speedy change in the conduct of public affairs and put atop to this running into debt beyond our means. It is apparent that we are drifting into such a state as our forefathers of Greece, that soon all will be gone except our lovely sunshine. Realizing this it becomes our duty to demand a better policy. He (Mr. Gordon) believed that the great policy of the government was a man of too large intellect for this small province. South Africa would be a better sphere for his gigantic intellect. More room would be at his command, and there he could mingle with such men as Cecil Rhodes and President Kruger. A man born in the midst of wealth, a man who during his life never knew the need of a dollar has but a faint idea of the difficulties with which our farmers are obliged to struggle. He had seen scores of farmers, day after day, going about wearing an expression of sadness and despair. They cannot get money to pay the tax, and he would like to see a man like that, who has a small sum of money, and yet the tax has to be paid. This tax may appear a small sum to the Leader of the Government, who knows nothing whatever of poverty; but it is a small matter to the down-trodden farmer, who finds it necessary to contribute so largely towards the funds of the Province. An eminent poet has said that poets make poor statesmen. He hoped that this could not be said of lawyers. However, this might be, and he was strongly of opinion that in this agricultural Province some eminent farmer, and not a lawyer, should be chosen to wield the helm of state, and he (Mr. Gordon) hoped that the time is near when the farmers of this Province would be led by one of their own men. This course appears to be the only one whereby the credit of the province can be saved. On the opposite side of the House he saw men of good judgment, men who were among his best friends, and yet those same men appear actually afraid to raise their voices against such a damaging course of affairs. He felt that he did not support it. The present Government denounced the Liberal administration for running the province into debt. But after five years rule the present administration had increased the debt to over \$400,000, notwithstanding the heavy taxes collected. And now they are increasing the provincial loan to \$175,000 and spending the sum of \$25,000 for a new wing to the asylum. This system must end, or it is difficult to say what is to become of the farmers. Already they are very uneasy, and it is certain that the farmers are the source of revenue. Notwithstanding the fact that the present Government has issued debentures to the amount of \$48,000, notwithstanding that the tax collected in 1894 amounted to \$44,445 and in 1895 to \$47,662, we find their annual deficits as follows: In 1891, \$20,000; in 1892, \$27,000; in 1893, \$112,000; in 1894, \$20,000; and in 1895, \$32,000. Their total debts, therefore, upwards of \$400,000. He hoped his honorable colleague would raise his voice in favor of making revenue and expenditure meet. The government are the loss and sineer of the Province. They are the motor power. If the Government does not change its course, the farmers will do so. One instance of the Government's management is sufficient to mention, and that is the Prince County registry office. That office was started in 8 months and a few weeks ago, and the government acquired the Smith estate on townships 23 and 24 containing 4,192 acres for which the sum of \$18,700 was paid. Your committee cannot but observe that this office is most inefficiently conducted, and they trust that it shall be so arranged that in the interest of the province it may be closed and wound up at an early day. Your committee find that the amount expended by the Public Works Department in 1895 was: On ordinary account, \$85,317 29; On capital account, \$39,369 55; \$124,686 84. This shows an increase over the year 1894 of \$1,145 41, largely owing to the additional expenditure necessary on account of the number of bridges carried away by the spring freshets, and the sums spent for completing the use of Fry Hill, and the repairs made on the ferry boats Southport and Edin. And your committee now entertain the hope that these important works having been completed the expenditure for the current year will be largely reduced without impairment of the public service.

Your committee have read with more than ordinary interest the report of the Commissioners of the Stock Farm and have great pleasure in recording the fact that for the first time in many years this Farm has been almost self-sustaining and that its value to the country under the management of the present commissioners is still worthy of your most careful consideration. Your committee find that the total amount paid for education during the year ending 31st Dec, 1895, was \$121,781.17. It is pleasing to note the fact that the progress of education in this Province is steady and encouraging. His people are glad to learn, fully appreciate their educational advantages and the large percentage of attendance at our public schools is the best evidence of this. Notwithstanding all that, your committee think it their duty to bring prominently to your notice the fact that rapid increase in the cost of education is annually being made. On referring to the Journal of the Assembly for the year 1894, your committee covered that the amount then paid for education was \$91,007.87, or a difference in cost for that year and the year 1895 of \$30,773.30, nearly one amount of the Government's deficit for last year.

He pointed out that in respect to the report of the Land Office in 1891 the balance due was \$324,889.67. By the report now before the House the balance on the 31st December, 1895, was \$149,000. Where was the balance of \$174,889.67 gone? We find that during the three years 1893, 1894 and 1895, \$79,863.94 have been received in that department, showing the sum of \$95,025.73 as having been granted as discounts during those years. Thus we find that the enormous amount of \$95,025.73 has been granted in the shape of discounts in order to obtain \$79,863.94, or at the rate of 118 per cent. Such has been the way that the Land Office has been managed under the present administration. At the evening session Mr. Shaw continued the criticism of the manner in which the Department of Public Lands was managed, and there were several lively passages between himself and the Commissioner of Crown Lands, Hon. Mr. Peters also took a hand in the debate.

Shortly before ten o'clock the report of the committee was adopted, the Opposition dissenting, and the House adjourned until ten o'clock on Wednesday.

WEDNESDAY, April 29. House met at 10.30. On motion Messrs. McKinnon, Rogers, (city), and J. A. Macdonald, were appointed a committee to prepare the usual address to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor on the occasion of the prorogation of the Legislature. On motion of Hon. Mr. Peters the bill amending the Public Schools Act, 1877, was read a second time, and the House went into committee with Mr. Rogers, Alberton, in the chair. The bill was reported agreed to. Hon. Mr. Peters moved that the rule be suspended and the bill be read a third time now. Mr. Shaw objected and Hon. Mr. Peters then moved that the bill be read a third time to-morrow. This carried. Mr. McKinnon, as chairman of the committee on the address to His Honor submitted the address, which was received and a committee was appointed to wait on His Honor. The report of the Contingent Accounts Committee was received and adopted. House then adjourned till 10 a. m. to-morrow.
