

St. Mary's Hand Hawks 8-5 Defeat In Game At Halifax Last Night

HALIFAX, Oct. 19 — (CP) — Halifax St. Mary's handed Moncton Hawks their fourth straight defeat of the 1950-51 Maritime Senior Hockey League schedule tonight as they slammed out an 8-5 victory.

Sparked by Gordon Miller, who added two goals and three assists to his total, Saints took a 2-1 lead in the first period and stayed on top for the duration of the game.

Top marksmen of the game was Dalton Barkwell who sank three goals for Hawks. Two of them came in the six-minute intermission.

Fretfullest play of the night came late in the second period. Bill Ford passed to Miller who crossed the blueline with George McGregor.

St. Mary's opened the scoring at the 2:37 mark of the first period. Five minutes later Moncton tied the score but Halifax came back to regain the lead and stayed on top from there in.

Halifax scored three more in the middle period while Moncton answered with a lone tally.

Ford continued the Halifax attack early in the third period. A power attack by the Haligonians found Colvin lacking and the curly-headed forward lashed the puck into the Moncton net at the 54-second mark.

Only six penalties marred the peaceful contest. Each team served three.

The defending big four champs had Les Colvin hopping in the Moncton nets as he was forced to handle 41 shots. Sonny MacDonald was the target for 28 Moncton scoring attempts.

Don (Peanuts) McLaughlin was the defensive star of the game. The stocky Halifax rearward broke up play after play as the Hawks attempted to crack the Halifax defence.

The victory was the second for Halifax in three games.

Canadiens Shut Out New York Rangers 4-0

MONTREAL, Oct. 19 — (CP) — Maurice (Rocket) Richard fired in his third and fourth goals of the season tonight as Montreal Canadiens whitewashed New York Rangers 4-0 in a National Hockey League game witnessed by 14,155 fans at the Montreal Forum.

Richard now leads all scorers in the League with four goals in as many games. His two tonight came in the first meeting between the Habs and the blue shirts. The game was decidedly spotty in almost mid-summer heat and the Rangers looked far less effective than Montreal.

Richard opened the scoring early in the second period while Rangers were shorthanded. He took Elmer Lach's pass from a face-off in the Ranger zone, skated his way out from the boards and rifled a shot to the far side of goalie Chuck Kayser.

Leo Gravelle made it 2-0 late in the same period on a rebound during a scramble, with Vern Kasper and Billy Reay drawing assists.

The Rocket's second, early in the middle period, came from a rebound off Norm Dussault's long shot. The final Canadian tally went to rookie Frank King on a break-away with Bert Hirschfeld.

Canadiens proved stronger on the defence as well as on the offence. Their close checking and solid rearward work held off New York through six minor penalties.

Several fistic flareups threatened but quickly died out.

In the nets, McNeil had 28 shots to handle against 33 for Rayner. The win left Canadiens still on top of the N. H. L. with six points in four games, three points ahead of Chicago and Detroit. Rangers remained next to the cellar.

Islanders Meet St. Mary's In Game At Forum Here Tonight

Murph Chamberlain and his Charlottetown Islanders will be gunning for their fourth straight victory in Maritime Senior "Big Four" Hockey League play when they step out on local Forum ice at 8:30 tonight to do battle with Halifax Saint Mary's for the second time in the week-old schedule.

Victorious in all of their league starts so far to take the measure of all the other three entries in the league, the Islanders had their toughest session against the Halifax squad in their league opening battle last Saturday.

Trailing the locals by only two points for the league leadership, the Saints are expected to be much tougher conditioned than they were last Saturday, and the Islanders will no doubt have to come up with their best performance if they expect to keep the Marty Barry-coached Haligonians in check.

Local fans will see a new face on the local roster tonight or at least that is what Club officials hoped for last night. He is Max Beaton, one of Sydney Millionaires high-scoring wingmen last season.

Officials reported last night that Beaton, who performed with Sydney against Charlottetown in Wednesday's exhibition tilt, is expected to fly here today from Sydney to join the Islanders Club, and will perform here tonight.

Beaton will be a strong addition to the already potent entry that Manager-Coach Murph Chamberlain has gathered together under the garnet and gold colors.

Art Perry was the big gun on both the scoring and kicking honors back on his three-quarters position. The big near 200-pound athlete crashed over the Bearcats' line twice during the first half at the end of speedy passing attacks and then demonstrated some smart place booting between the uprights to convert his own touchdowns.

But practically the whole roster came up with standout performances. Noel Wilson, Howard Glover, Jack Hennessey, Ledwell, Tom Davis, Charley Reedy and Ronnie Nicholson, all of the Abbie forward section, came up with effective scrum work and hard tackling that kept the Truro boys in trouble all through the session.

Except for some rugged and stout defensive work by the Bearcats in times of stress, the score would have been much higher. Time after time they were stopped from scoring by a matter of inches.

Back in the fullback position, young Arnold McCallum also turned in an effective performance, and although he wasn't called upon to fill the breach very often, spent most of his time well up with the attackers. Filling in at the end of one backfield attack, Arnold went over himself after a twenty yard run, only to lose possession of the ball. Speedy Red Howatt scored the other touchdown in the first half at the end of a nice run, and teamed up with Wilson and Blanchard in the second half for their final score. It was one of the prettiest plays of the day. Wilson started the play with a pass to Howatt who carried for about twenty-five yards before passing to Blanchard who covered another good fifteen yards before going over.

Ross Milligan, ranga Truro half-back was the star for the visitors when he pulled a smart 30-yard run in the second half to score their only try. Milligan scooped up a blocked kick and dashed down the left sideline for a well-earned score. Going over at the left corner of the Abbie line, it gave Jake Corbett a hard target for a convert for the extra points. Over-anxious at the hard angle, Corbett topped the ball and it never left the ground.

North Americans Draw Tickets

DUBLIN, Oct. 19 — (AP) — North Americans scored heavily today in the draw for major prizes in the richest Irish Hospital Sweepstakes since 1947.

Indications were that 40 to 50 per cent of the prize pool of \$900,856 (about \$2,675,224) will cross the Atlantic to the United States and Canada. Payoff of the big prizes depends on the outcome of the Cambridgehire at Newmarket, England, next Wednesday.

Irish nurses, working relays, drew the tickets from a huge steel "drum of fortune" in an airplane hangar. The tickets were on all 82 horses originally entered, although those expected to run had been reduced to 36 by today.

Holders of tickets on the Cambridgehire winner will receive \$25,000 each; ticket holders on the second horse will receive \$10,000 each; and on the third horse \$5,000 each.

The favorite is Socrates, with odds of 6 to 1.

Heat Wave Postpones Hockey Game

CHICAGO, Oct. 19 — (AP) — Chicago's record-breaking autumn heat wave today forced postponement of a National Hockey League game.

Chicago Stadium reported it could not form a satisfactory ice service for the first time in Stadium history.

Chicago Black Hawks were to have played Detroit Red Wings tonight. Thousands of tickets had been sold.

The temperature in Chicago at 2 p. m. CST hit 79.

The only previous postponement of a league game was in Boston Nov. 10, 1949, because of fog over the ice surface, the Black Hawks said.

Jack Tholmer, all-star right winger in the Cape Breton League for two seasons, will leave his Walkerton, Ont., home for Glace Bay Saturday, and will arrive Monday. Also due in from Saint John is Montreal's Roger Jodoin, who also is under suspension for playing without an inter-branch transfer. Jodoin started the season with Beavers, but has not been released by Miners.

Cop First Place In League; Game One Of Roughest At Saint John

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 19 — (CP) — One of the roughest games ever played here ended in a 4-4 win for Charlottetown Islanders over Saint John Beavers tonight as the island team copped first place in the Maritime Senior Hockey League, a game ahead of both Beavers and Halifax St. Mary's.

Numerous infractions went unpunished while the husky Islanders, fast and in good condition, sped to victory in the bruising contest. The penalties that were imposed, however, included two misconducts and a match misconduct in a hectic second period.

Charlottetown gained a 2-1 lead in the opening frame and lengthened it to 6-4 before the middle session ended. Walter Pawlynshyn led the island goal-getters with a brace but teammate Murray Richardson gained three points for assists. Buck Whitlock of Beavers also shot two and Tommy Brennan, with two assists, led Saint John in that department.

Pawlynshyn opened the scoring from a scramble in front of the net while Beavers were short-handed. Bob Legere, racing from blueline to blueline, backhanded the equalizer. Pawlynshyn's second tally, the last of the period, appeared offside but was allowed. The number of stops, 11 by Hal Gordon in the island cage and five by Dennis Brodeur, was a good indication of first session play.

At one point in the hard second period Saint John was again only one goal behind, 4-3, before the visitors counted two more.

Fireworks started when Charlottetown's Johnny Horeck and Eddie Bolan tangled. Each received a 10-minute misconduct. Bolan rejoined the Beaver lineup after receiving his release from Glace Bay Miners. Winger Roger Jodoin still awaited a release from the same team.

The next major penalty was against Red Favaro of Charlottetown. He suffered a match misconduct for striking a goal judge. The incident occurred after Favaro shot a marker which failed to elicit the red light.

Goalie Brodeur, who had a minor illness, was replaced in the last stanza by Gordon Mabe. Howard Beaudry and Bucko Trainer shot two more, both from close in, before the game ended. Richardson assisted each.

Added to these is one death in Canadian football, the third in the history of senior football in Canada. Jack Bell, 25-year-old quarterback of Sarnia Imperials, died Tuesday from injuries suffered in a game last Saturday with Toronto Balmly Beach in the Ontario Senior Football Union.

The dazed 16-year-olds who put Callander, Ont., on the map appeared in their first high-heeled shoes and their first lip-stick, backed by 11 singing schoolmates from Corbell, Ont. Their songs, some in French and some in English, included "The Sidewalks of New York," a favorite of the late Al Smith.

The girls also sported new hairdos, the work of Cecile Sawyer of Lowell, Mass., who was engaged by the Quints two months ago. Miss Sawyer, after studying huge photographs of her famous clients, wrote and asked them to let their short-bobbed hair grow out.

"What I have worked out for them is soft curls and an appropriate teen-age style of medium length," she said.

And — with Papa Olivia Dionne's nod of assent — she taught them the fine art of applying their first lipstick and powder.

The session with the beauty expert followed a hectic day of taking in the big city's sights. The girls are still amazed at the attention they attract, but find the stars friendly.

The only appearance where they have not been mobbed by a waiting crowd was when they mingled unnoticed with other worshippers in the quiet of St. Patrick's Catholic convent, guests of Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York.
