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DEPLORES "HIDDEN TAXES"

Speaking at a joint meeting of the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce and the Canadian Club of Winnipeg, Rene Perrault, president of Canadian Chamber of Commerce, objected to "hidden" government taxes. He claimed that in first nine months of fiscal year by means of hidden taxes and payroll deductions, the average Canadian has contributed to a Federal Government surplus of more than \$700,000,000, a sum greater than the total amount required in 1939.

Taken Off In Whaleboat — The 32 of the Pendleton's company saved were taken off by chief boatswain Donald Bangs and three mates in a motor whaleboat. 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Canada's Trade Figures Released

OTTAWA, Feb. 18 (CP) — Canada boomed purchases from the United States by almost \$700,000,000 in 1951, ending the year with a \$479,000,000 deficit in trade with her southern neighbor. The U.S. deficit was the highest since 1947.

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
