After taking in coal, the steamer remained anchored off the harbor for twelve or fourteen hours.

PROFESSOR.—Articles of agreement have been signed for a prize fight with hard gloves between Patrick Killen, of Chicago, and Joseph Lawson, now of Boston, but formerly of Prince Edward Island. The fight is to take place at or near St. Paul, Minn., on the 8th November, and is for \$500 a side and a heavy-weight championship belt. Both men are able and willing, and the result is anxiously awaited by sporting men.

THE tramp, "Whitman," has at last taken his departure for parts unknown. After his pranks at Bradalbane the atmosphere of the Island became too hot for him and he resolved to leave the Island. He went to Cape Traverse on Saturday and on that night twice attempted to enter a house but was frightened off. On Saturday morning he stole a boat belonging to a man named Gardner, started for Cape Tormentine, and in the evening arrived safely at Cape Jourdain. On reaching Cape Tormentine he procured the services of Mr. Irving Allan who drove him to Amherst. It occurred to those who saw Whitman at the other side that he might be the party who murdered young Fitzpatrick. The Attorney General was immediately communicated with and, after considerable telegraphing, it was discovered that the refugee was Whitman. The news of his departure will be a relief to the fair portion of the community.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.]

Hon. Edward Blake's Resignation.

TORONTO, Oct. 27. The English mail yesterday brought the rumor from London that Hon. Edward Blake had despatched to Canada, by that post, his resignation as leader of the Reform Party. Whether the report be true or false there is, at present, no means of finding out. It is well known that the demands of his position as leader have forced him out of the pursuit of his profession, and that he has to fight a losing battle at a loss of \$25,000 a year. It is also known that at a recent caucus of prominent Grits here, the question of Leadership, in view of approaching general elections, was discussed. Blake has cases coming before the Imperial Privy Council in February, for which he has or will receive about \$14,000 fees, and it was stated at the caucus that he would either have to give up these fees, or the leadership of the party. There have also been of late visible symptoms in various ways pointing to Attorney General Mowat as the new leader of the party.

The Eastern Question.

ST PETERSBURG, Oct. 27. News Fremya publishes an interview which its correspondent at Philippopolis had with the Bulgarian premier, M. Karareloff. M. Karareloff denied that Bulgaria had any agreement with England or Austria, before the Roumelian revolution respecting the union of Bulgaria and Roumelia and said they acted on their own responsibility in taking the initiative in bringing about the union. If there was any instigation in the matter, said the Premier, it was Russia whose Consul General at Philippopolis first agitated him, and helped to start a newspaper devoted to the cause of union with Bulgarian money. When I entered the Ministry, believing the game dangerous, I stopped the subsidy of the Bulgarian Government to the newspaper. Mr. Karareloff reaffirmed the statement that Prince Alexander notified Russia of the intention of Roumelia to unite with Bulgaria, and that Roumelia was willing to continue Turkish suzerainty, but would not cede an inch of territory. In conclusion the Bulgarian Premier said, if Turkey declares war, we alone are able to raise Macedonia in three days. A European war is none of our business, and we are not alarmed at the armaments of Greece. As to her army, it is far from being terrible.

Servia's Attitude.

BELGRADE, Oct. 27. Reports from the frontier say that the Serbian regulars fired upon the Serbian Customs officials at Negotina, and that the officials withdrew from their posts pending orders, but afterwards re-occupied them. The latest communication from the powers to the Serbian Government promises that the status quo in Roumelia would be restored, and demanded that the Serbian army be demobilized.

The Porte Active.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 27. The Porte continues massing troops at all points available for the offensive operations in Eastern Roumelia, in event of extreme measures being resorted to. A despatch from Smyrna to-day says that 200,000 men of the reserves have gone to Salonica.

Thebaw Murdered.

RANGOON, Oct. 27. It is rumored here that a revolution has broken out at Mandalay, and that King Thebaw has been murdered. At Rangoon, forty-pounder guns have been erected on cargo boats to reduce King Thebaw's forts.

Thebaw Warlike.

CALCUTTA, Oct. 27. Advice from Mandalay, dated Oct. 22, say that King Thebaw scorned pacific counsels, and is fortifying every available point on the proposed line of British advance.

Lord Salisbury.

LONDON, Oct. 27. Lord Salisbury, who yesterday underwent a surgical operation of an abscess of the arm, is making steady progress toward early recovery.
