Honor Slogan

This is minor hockey week, and once again goes forth the slogan: "Don't send your boy to the rink; take him." It is regrettable that in recent years this slogan has been honored "more in the breach than in the observance", but let's hope that this year the parents, many of whom are, of course, very busy people, will find the time to accompany Junior to the rink and watch him go through his paces.

The minor hockey program may be said to have a four-fold purpose: (1) To provide the boys with healthful exercise. They may get a few charley horses in addition but

nothing to really hurt. (2) To teach them the techniques or tricks of hockey, so that they may be better adult hockey players whether they are among the very few who reach the pro circuits, the larger number who catch on with the Crystals or other teams at Senior competition, or the much larger group who play their hockey in Intermediate or Industrial leagues, or who just foot around the ice surfaces for the fun of it. (3) To teach the boys the value of co-operative effort and the importance of good sportsmanship. (4) To give them a jolly good time, which is the birthright of youngsters all over our land,

Success Depends On Leaders

No. 1 and No. 4 present few problems. Exercise and entertainment are pretty sure to be plentiful, supply in this minor hockey program. The success of no. 2 and no. 3 depend to a large extent on the leaders and, of course, to some extent on the boys themselves. You don't have to be a good hockey player to be a good teacher of hockey, though it certainly helps. There are notable exceptions in the big time. A coach might take the Mahovich and Percival articles, supplement them with other material, and work out a good hockey course for youngsters.

Too much instruction and too little hockey would not be popular with the small fry, however. They want to get in there and bully it out with the opposition. A happy combination of both would reflect the coach's ability. Sportsmanship and co-operation—the eclipsing of one's yearning for glory for the sake of the team—is important, and could serve the boys well as they take their places in adult living. This is what really measures the worth of a coach.

The minor hockey seems to be well taken care of in Summerside this winter. We are not going into raptures about our program, because that is the conventional thing to do, and it is sometimes done—ad nauseum. It is sufficient to say that Hank Landry and Grant Grady are good types of young men for such work. According to reports, they are working hard and hold the respect of their charges. They have introduced "chalk talks" which seems a sound idea.

Third Period Scoring Spree Sends Leafs To 5-1 Win

BOSTON (CP)—Toronto poured four goals through a collapsing Boston defence in the final period Sunday night for a 5-1 National Hockey League victory. George Armstrong, Dave Keon and Frank Mahovich all scored unassisted.

The unaided tallies came after Ron Stewart snapped a 1-1 deadlock at 7:50 of the finale. Bruins goalie Bruce Gamble, who had registered two victories since being recalled from the minors, tried to clear the puck himself when Boston was short-handed. Bert Olmstead intercepted the puck and passed to Stewart who slapped home a 20-footer.

Armstrong found the range less than two minutes later and the rout was in full swing. The teams had been locked in a tense struggle for more than two periods.

Bob Pulford registered for Leafs with the game little more than four minutes old on a 40-footer which broke off Gamble's glove into the net. Boston tied matters when Andre Pronovost raced down the left boards from his own zone, cut across a half-stap ahead of Allen Stanley and backhanded a 20-footer.

The goal tending was a stand-off, too, in a stirring duel. Johnny Bower felled Dick Meiser on a breakaway and just before the end of the second period Gamble made a fine stop against Keon breaking in alone.

But once the bubble burst near the middle of the final period, the last-place Bruins fell apart before the onslaught of the second-place visitors.

Armstrong got the first sale goal at 9:25. He took the puck from a scramble and fired low, the disc going in off Gamble's glove.

Keon made it 4-1 at 13:32 when he picked up a loose puck behind the Boston net, skated around and beat Gamble from close in.

Mahovich wound up the scoring at 17:47.

The win left Maple Leafs three points behind leading Montreal Canadiens, who beat Detroit 5-3.

Bruins, who won 5-4 at Toronto Saturday night, are deep in the cellar with 11 wins and four ties in 45 starts.

Gamble had 28 saves, 14 of them in the final period. Bower stopped 30 Boston shots.

Referee Frank Udvari called only seven minor penalties, four of them going to the Maple Leafs.

DETROIT (AP)—Montreal Canadiens, victimized by defensive lapses that cost an early two-goal lead, fought back Sunday night for a 5-3 victory over Detroit Red Wings on third-period goals by Henri Richard and Claude Provost.

Canadiens, leaders of the National Hockey League, extended their unbeaten streak to eight games.

Richard snapped a 3-3 deadlock at 5:50 of the final period on a pretty setup by Provost, who carried the puck down from the Montreal zone.

Within four minutes Provost had scored his 25th goal this season on a high 40-footer. Provost is the NHL's scoring leader.

Canadiens jumped to a 3-0 lead on first-period goals by Gilles Tremblay and Bernie Geoffrion. But Wings evened it before the end of the period.
