MR. EDWIN TALBOT of the London Patriotic World, is now in Toronto. He is making a sketching tour of the Dominion and has got as far West as Toronto on his way from Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa.

STILL THEY COME.—Over 250 immigrants landed in Montreal on Monday last en route for the Northwest. They came principally from England and Ireland with the intention of settling in the Northwest.

UNDervaluation.—A number of horses from the Maritime Provinces have lately been seized at Boston for attempted evasion of revenue laws, proof of undervaluation having in most cases been furnished from places of shipment.

TORONTO is enjoying the prospect of being entirely burnt down one of these days. On Sunday evening last, there were five alarms of fire in different parts of the city. The fires caused the destruction of a large amount of property, and are believed to be incendiaries.

THE Halifax Grain Elevator is pronounced by a good judge, Mr. McLaughlan, of Stratford, Ont., to be one of the most complete and perfect in America. Mr. McLaughlan is, says the Herald, quite sanguine of the ultimate success of the elevator, and expressed a very decided opinion that before long another of equal, if not larger capacity, than the present one would be required. He appeared to think there was only one fault to be found with it, and that was, that its capacity—250,000 bushels—was not large enough for the grain trade which he is sure will before long come to Halifax. With a liberal adjustment of railway rates, he is going to make a much larger and more extensive shipment shortly. For this purpose he is about to visit Great Britain, in order to make arrangements with consignees at the different large ports there, in order that the grain may be shipped direct.

The Queen's Health. LONDON, June 7. Since the arrival of Her Majesty at Balmoral Castle her health has much improved, and hopes are now entertained of a speedy recovery.

Poisoning by Invincibles. DUBLIN, June 7. The police of Dublin City, Ireland, are investigating some suspicious cases of poisoning, which are believed to be the work of Invincibles.

Resignation of Lord Roseberry. LONDON, June 7. Lord Roseberry, Under Secretary of Home Affairs in the Imperial Government has tendered his resignation to Mr. Gladstone. The resignation is said to be due to recent expressions in the House of Commons that the Under Secretary for the Home Department should be a member of the House of Commons.

Preparations for War. PARIS, June 7. China is now making extensive preparations for war with France. She has already on the field an army corps of fifty batteries of artillery besides a fleet of twenty large ironclads, thoroughly equipped for active service.

The Porte's Demand. CONSTANTINOPLE, June 7. The Porte has asked the Powers that the financial clauses embodied in the Berlin Treaty be fulfilled, before any other reforms should be insisted upon.

Suspension of a Russian Paper. MOSCOW, June 7. The Moscow Telegraph has been suspended by the authorities for giving too free utterance in its columns regarding the Imperial Administration.

Telegraph Notes. Lord Dufferin has been decorated with the grand cross of the order of the Bath. The informers, Kavanagh and Hanlon, were sent to England from Dublin on the 4th inst. Dr. Schumacher, late Consul General of Germany at New York, has been appointed German Minister, residence at Lima. Advice received from Sierra Leone, under date of May 24th, say fifty persons were roasted alive for witchcraft in Sherbro district. It is the intention of the Vatican to express its thanks to Great Britain for the aid she has extended to Catholic missionaries in Soudan.

Lord Roseberry has resigned the office of Under Secretary for the Home Department in the British Government. John Tomlinson Hibbert, M. P. for Oldham and Parliamentary Secretary to the Local Government Board, has been appointed his successor. The resignation is due to recent expressions of feeling in the House of Commons that the Under Secretary for the Home Department should be a member of the House of Commons.

It is rumored that the Invincibles have been extensively using poison in removing obnoxious persons. The police are investigating a number of cases of suspicious deaths which have occurred in the last few years, especially the case of a hotel keeper named Jury, of Dublin, who died a fortnight after the Phoenix Park murders. From the disclosures of the informers the authorities do not doubt that Jury was poisoned. The reason alleged for poisoning is that he inadvertently opened a letter addressed to Tynan, who was staying at Jury's hotel. Jury discovered that the letter contained directions in regard to a secret society, declaring vengeance by the members of the society. Jury destroyed the letter. A waiter, however, informed Tynan that Jury had received a letter for him. It is thought that Jury's murder was then decided on.
