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CROP REPORT

WINNIPEG, Man., June 23.—Further improvement in moisture conditions occurred throughout the three western provinces during the past week as a result of showers or heavy rains reported from practically all sections. The one adverse condition is continued threat of grasshopper damage coincident with warmer weather. Areas previously reporting slight frost damage have shown almost complete recovery while soil dried districts in southern Saskatchewan show only partial recovery where earlier damage was severe, according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture, Canadian National Railways.

Additional Funds For American Army

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—The House of Representatives passed and sent to the Senate today a \$22,695,547 supplemental army appropriation after rejecting a Republican amendment which would have reduced by 1,293 planes the proposed expansion of the United States Army Corps to 5,500 planes. The House of Representatives joined the Senate in a \$225,000,000 fund for farm parity payments in addition to the regular \$500,000,000 soil conservation benefit fund.

S., June 21.—(CP)—William Brown, truck driver of near-by Glace Bay, was convicted in Supreme Court today on a manslaughter charge in connection with the death of Thomas Wadden struck by Brown's truck last Nov. 19 at Glace Bay. ELEVEN AND HALF MILLION BOYS AND GIRLS BETWEEN 15 AND 19 YEARS OF AGE

Grace Clifford Howard, research secretary of the Scientific Temperance Federation, Boston, in a recent release gives parents something to think about. She says: "Did you realize that, according to the last census, the United States contains 11,552,000 young people between the ages of fifteen and nineteen? If you have expended any time at all thinking about that particular nine per cent of our population, you have doubtless realized that they are or should be the responsibility of many millions of parents—parents who should be both ready and anxious by example and precept to persuade youth to seek out paths that lead to the development of ethical character; to finding the better things of life; to being in their turn, an example to the next generation."

"This is the day of the cocktail hour, when cocktails and suggestions of cocktails are thrust upon one at every turn. Whose fault is it that, according to the Chicago Tribune, more than half the youth studied in a recent survey made by the American Youth Commission admitted that they drank liquor? Whose fault is it that 83 per cent of the youth studied in New York by this same commission declared they had indulged? A few months ago, the Los Angeles Times quoted Superintendent Vierling Kersey of the public schools of Los Angeles, Calif., as saying that the three major problems confronting the schools at present are alcohol, gambling and irresponsibility."
