Income Tax Appeal Board Gives Ruling

OTTAWA (CP)—The income tax appeal board has ruled that the government can legally collect taxes on profits of investment dealers on the investments made in dealers' interests.

The board in a judgment made public Wednesday rejected the argument of a British Columbia investment firm that such profits are capital gain and non-taxable. It dismissed the investment company's appeal against a \$20,636.79 tax assessment in 1950.

Evidence showed that McMahon and Burns Ltd., the investment house concerned, bought for \$91,500 debentures of the Interprovincial Pipe Line Company as a company investment. During 1950, the year following, sale of three bonds brought a profit of \$54,776.25.

The company claimed the profit was non-taxable as capital gain since purchase and sale had been conducted purely as a private transaction for the firm.

The judgment, signed by R. W. S. Fordham, board member, said "It would be drawing altogether too fine a distinction to define a dividing line between the appellant's ordinary business operations on behalf of its customers and its business activities in purchasing and selling debentures on its own behalf."

Interesting Addresses Last Night At C. W. L. Annual Convention Dinner

"Fourteen years as a priest in Western Canada, with a full knowledge of the effective work of the Catholic Women's League especially in the remote and scattered areas, prompts me to say that the clergy are under a deep debt of gratitude to the organization for their help in the growth of the church in Western Canada." Very Rev. Gregory Murphy, C.S.R., told members of the C.W.L. last evening. Father Murphy was guest speaker at the dinner meeting of the 32nd annual Diocesan Provincial Convention at the Queen Hotel.

Father Murphy described in detail the growth of the missions along the Alaska Highway and where small subdivisions of the Catholic Women's League were formed. They visited the sick, taught young children their catechism, and made it possible for the clergy to range far into the country without fear of neglect of those at the central mission. "Later, at Saskatoon we found further evidence of a healthy organization and a desire to serve on the part of the C.W.L. where hundreds of displaced Catholic persons from Europe were met, assisted and taught English in numerous night classes. I have very happy memories of the League in Canada."

Right Reverend Msgr. G. J. MacLellan, P.A., Vice-Capitular of the Diocese of Charlottetown admonished the members to "become not weary in well doing. You are lay apostles, as indicated in the work you are doing and the greatest sermon you can preach when you attend retreats and seek to become closer to the Saviour. Self-denial," Msgr. MacLellan said, "the spirit of religion, prompts you to assist institutions, where and when necessary and conduct homes for children who will also develop in all good works, with respect for law and devotion to God and country. By overcoming selfishness we shall advance the Kingdom of God here on earth and reap a great harvest in the years to come."

The annual convention of the Catholic Women's League opened yesterday morning at 9 o'clock with Mass at St. Dunstan's Basilica, Right Rev. Monsignor Patrick McMahon being celebrant. He also addressed the delegates and members on their theme for the year "Greater Love and Devotion to the Mother of God, especially through the Family Rosary."

Rev. Geo. J. McCormac, Director, opened the business session at Notre Dame convent with prayer. The President, Mrs. L. L. Noonan, presided. Routine reports were received and dealt with and a letter of regret at not being present was read from the National President, Mrs. Drake. Fifteen provincial conveners submitted their reports and the sub-division reports were given by the presidents.

Afternoon meeting

Rev. Father Ayers addressed the afternoon meeting on missionary work of the church, stressing "The Propagation of the Faith" and "The Holy Childhood Society", both of which are officially recognized.

Rev. G. J. McCormac, Provincial Director, C.W.L. spoke briefly and admonished the members to remember that they were of tremendous value to any priest or pastor in taking on parochial duties in the interest of their church.

"It is important," Father McCormac said, "to remain in the State of grace, and to be without a sub-division which should not be overshadowed by the larger units. You are all part of a National organization which covers all Canada."

Sir William MacMillan, O.B.E. said "I have watched with increasing interest the progress and growth of the C.W.L. since its organization more than 30 years ago and tonight recall the splendid work done in the earlier years by the late Mrs. McIntyre, who was called to the highest position, that of National President, in the Catholic Women's League, and Mrs. Frank Murray who worked so valiantly side by side with non-Catholic women in the campaign against salacious literature. INCREASED SALES VOLUME REPORTED AT CO-OP SERVICES ASSN. MEETING

A greatly increased physical volume of sales, despite the fact the dollar value of them remained the same, was noted in the manager's report submitted by Mr. Jerome O'Brien at the fifth annual meeting of the Island Co-op Services Co-operative Association held at the Canadian Legion Home yesterday afternoon.

The financial report showed total assets of \$445,000 with liabilities at only \$305,000. The net income for the year was reported as \$35,439. Sales for the year amounted to \$3,085,333 while the cost of the goods sold was \$2,801,363. The largest single item in this list was the business done in butter, eggs, poultry and the hatchery. A close second was the turnover in potatoes, turnips, bags and fertilizer. The gross income from all sources, including insurance, was \$192,292. Operating expenses amounted to \$156,853.

In his report as manager Mr. O'Brien said: "During the year we reduced our former six departments to three. (1) Produce marketing, (2) Poultry and Egg Dept., (3) Wholesale Grocery and Equipment Dept."

"All departments showed a net earning except insurance which showed a small loss, in spite of the increased sales of all types of insurance. After the end of the year we reorganized the insurance department directly under Maritime Co-op Services. We feel that the new insurance service will be more efficient and will render better service to the co-operative of P. E. I."

"During the year we tried several experiments in rail grade

marketing of cattle, through Maritime Co-op and Eastern Farmers Co-op, with good results. We have surveyed the cattle marketing situation on P. E. I. and feel that livestock marketing should be a separate department of I. C. S. before real progress can be made on this marketing problem. We agree with Mr. Roy Grant, of M.C.S. that "rail grade marketing is the only fair way of establishing proper values and improved quality." Rail grading permits the marketing department to do its bargaining for sales while the animals are in a position where a choice of markets is still available. We suggest that our local co-ops encourage and promote rail-grade livestock marketing.

"Once more I regret to report that fish marketing has been carried on on a very limited scale. We require a separate department under a manager to handle this marketing problem. We understand that our local fish co-ops are about ready to present a plan for fish marketing. We feel that this department should have very close cooperation from the co-ops involved. We trust that we will see this problem solved before our next annual meeting.

"As your manager I am forced to report that our present business premises have been once more outgrown. Recently we have been able to purchase a war surplus building and also have a lot available to set up permanent quarters for your co-operative. This building is very important for the future but your Board of
