

New Micro-Wave Link In Full Operation In About 2 Weeks

Two weeks from now the new micro-wave link connecting Prince Edward Island with the mainland will be in full operation. At present the hook-up is being maintained to test the system.

This information was released yesterday by Mr. Earl MacDonnell, maintenance foreman for the Island Telephone Company.

The link has its start at Fraser's Mountain, Nova Scotia. From there the signal is transmitted to Charlottetown via Mount Buchanan and Hazelgrove, P. E. I. The second circuit in the link runs from the City to Hazelgrove to Summerside to Exmouth Bay, where it connects with the radio link to Montserrat, St. B.

For the initial period of its operation the system will carry national broadcasts of the CBC Radio and T. V. network. Later the system will be utilized to carry long distance calls between P. E. I. and New Glasgow, N. S.

MUCH MORE STABLE

"This new system," said Mr. MacDonnell, "will be much more stable than the land-wire circuit, being less liable to damage by the elements." To ensure continuous service each of the micro-wave stations is equipped with

Comment: It was only a question of whether "proper arrangements" could be made for the installation.

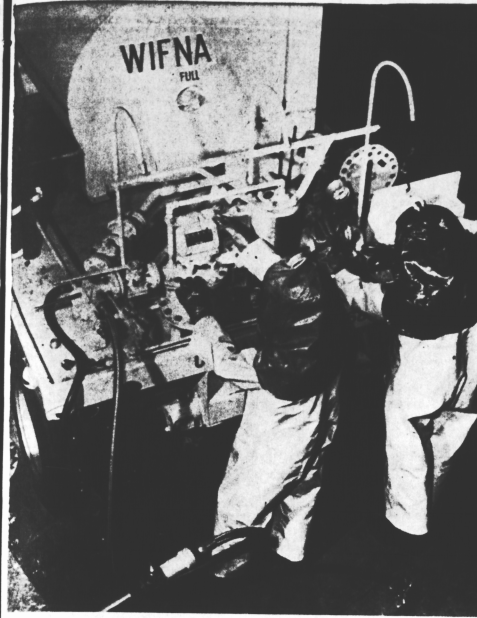

Polio Cases in Canada Cut By 50 Per Cent This Year

Polio cases in Canada this year have been cut by 50 per cent compared with last year, according to a report from the Health Department.

The report shows that there were 262 cases of polio in Canada in 1956, compared with 520 cases in 1955. This represents a decrease of 49.2 per cent.

The report also shows that there were 16 polio deaths in 1956, compared with 32 deaths in 1955. This represents a decrease of 50 per cent.

The Health Department attributes this decrease to the widespread use of the Salk vaccine, which was first introduced in Canada in 1955.

Traffic Cases Heard In City

Violations of the Highway Traffic Act comprising the greater portion of the docket dealt with by magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court Wednesday morning.

For driving whilst his licence was suspended an accused from Vernon River was fined fifty dollars and costs or thirty days.

A man from New Brunswick was given a fine of five dollars and costs or five days. A similar sentence was imposed upon a resident of Central Rosslyn for failing to transfer the registry of a car.

A resident of Cornwall charged with driving whilst impaired was remanded until December 11. R.R. Bell, Q.C., appeared as counsel for the defence. An accused from Summerside and another from Paradise both charged with operating a motor vehicle without rear lights by the hours of sunset and sunrise, were each fined five dollars and costs or five days.

A reprintman also given a Millview man for operating a motor vehicle when his view was obscured by a shattered windshield. Fines of five dollars and costs or five days were imposed on a resident of Vernon and another from Brackley Point for operating motor vehicles with defective equipment, lights, mudflaps, etc.

A speeder from Mount Stewart was fined ten dollars and costs or five days.

Under the Temperance Act a Charlottetown female charged with the unlawful possession and intoxicating liquor not purchased on her own individual permit, was dismissed. Also under the act, for being intoxicated in a public place a resident of North River was fined twenty dollars and costs or thirty days.

Charlottetown relay antennas differs from the remainder of those on the link, in that its antennas are mounted to transmit the beam on a direct horizontal plane. At Charlottetown the antennas are mounted only fifteen feet above the roof of the Telephone Building. Temperature At South Pole

The temperature at the South Pole hit a recorded high last Friday of 22 degrees below zero, the highest ever reported since the station was set up in 1956.

The previous high recorded at the Pole was six degrees below zero. However, weather records have been kept at the Pole less than a year and it was not known whether the recent warm spell was unique.

Consider Wheat Sale To China

Ottawa (CP) — Any request by Communist China to buy Canadian wheat would be given very serious consideration by the Canadian wheat board, Trade Minister Gordon Churchill said Wednesday night.

"We are not opposed to trading with any country," he said in the House.

Divided Island

New Guinea, with an area of 322,000 square miles and a population of 1,500,000, was an exception to the general independence agreement, an intractable land of snow-capped mountains, volcanoes, swamps, rain forest and plateaus and spiny antlers. The people are mostly Negroid, including pygmies.

The western section of the island is under Dutch control, while the eastern section, including Papua, stayed under the administration of Australia, which had exercised trusteeship over the area first under the League of Nations and later under the United Nations.

Indonesian demands for sovereignty over New Guinea at home and in the United States, do not affect the mandate of Australia, which has been striving to educate the people under its control.

Famous English Newsmen Dies

BRIGHTON, England (CP) — William Thomas Curtis-Wilson, chairman and managing director of the Brighton and Hove Herald, died Wednesday at his home. He was 69.

Curtis-Wilson was a former president of Britain's Newspaper Society.

Tariffs Swept Aside In Deal

THE HAGUE (AP) — Europe's parliamentary ratification of the common market and European treaties was completed Wednesday when Holland's upper house of parliament unanimously approved Dutch participation.

The bills were passed 46 to 5. Against them were 11 Communist and three individual dissenters.

Holland's lower house passed the bill 114 to 102 Oct. 4.

The action meant that six West European powers—the Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, Italy, France and West Germany—will start weaving a single tariff and quota barriers among them, probably on Jan. 1. They will place the development of nuclear power for industry in the hands of a joint European atomic energy commission.

Canadian Firm To Drill For Oil In Algeria

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Canadian Delphi Oil Ltd. entered into an agreement Nov. 29 with the French government and a French oil company to secure a concession in Algeria. G. W. Murchison, president of Canadian Delphi, reported Wednesday.

Under terms of the agreement, Canadian Delphi will form a French subsidiary, Franco-Delphi S.A. (Frandel), which will own and operate the concession when obtained. The other half will be held by the Société des Participations de l'Algérie (Soparal), a firm created by the French government for the venture, and Compagnie Franco-Africaine de Recherches Pétrolières (Francar).

It will be several months before the concession is actually granted. Canadian Delphi was instrumental in forming Trans-Canada Petroleum Lines Ltd.
